A recitalist that ".... plays with zeal and intelligence, with equal parts passion and poetry" (PIPEDREAMS, Minnesota Public Radio), Dr. Terry will share his musical talent as well as give background and context for this remarkable repertoire.

A resident of Washington, D.C., Dr. Terry has concertized throughout the United States including the Kennedy Center, the Piccolo-Spoleto Festival and the American Guild of Organists national conventions in New York City and Denver.

His recording of works by Pulitzer Prize winner, George Walker, appears on the Albany Records label, as well as on MPR's "Pipedreams Premieres, Vol. 2."





ATTENTION!

Clarification needs to be made regarding the use of "S" and "N" in the last several issues of *Pipenotes*. What prompted the use of both the "S" and "N" in front of a person's name was the fact that both the "Substitute Sunday" and "Substitute not Sunday" boxes were checked on a number of membership renewal forms. My understanding of this was that when both boxes were checked it indicated that the person would be available to play on Sundays AND would be available also to play on any other days of the week, for mid-week services or for weddings and funerals. Apparently, many people were confused and thought this was a contradiction.

Due to this confusion, I have gone back to the old system of "S" meaning **Available** to play on Sundays and "N" meaning **Not available** to play on Sundays. **Either one letter or the other is now entered.**

I would like input from the substitutes. If, when you filled out the membership form and checked both boxes, your intent was that you are available on Sundays AND for other services on other days as well, please call me at home (952) 432-6995 or at work (952) 835-6418 x23 and let me know. If enough people call me on this, I will designate a new letter and new wording to make it clear that you are available for special services **not** held on Sundays.



ADVENT/CHRISTMAS HYMN FESTIVAL LED BY MICHAEL BURKHARDT

Westwood Lutheran Church welcomes Dr. Michael Burkhardt, who will lead an Advent/Christmas hymn festival on Sunday, **Dec. 15** at **4:00 pm**. The poetry of Dietrich Bonhoeffer will provide the anchoring texts for the selected Advent and Christmas hymns. Joining Dr. Burkhardt in leading congregational singing in this festival are Westwood's A Cappella Choir, children's choirs, bell choir and a brass quartet. This is sure to be a worshipful, thought-provoking and spiritual musical event to prepare our hearts for the birth of the Christ Child.

Known for his creative hymn festivals and recitals, Michael Burkhardt is in frequent demand as a choral and organ clinician and recitalist. He is a graduate of Carthage College, Kenosha, Wisconsin, where he was a student of organist Bill Roth and

conductor John Windh, and of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, where he studied organ under Dr. Robert Anderson and choral conducting under Lloyd Pfautsch. He recently received his D.M.A. degree in organ performance, Summa cum laude, from Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona.

Dr. Burkhardt has served parishes in Southern California and Minneapolis as organist-director of music, and Christ College Irvine, Irvine, California, as college organist and head of studies in church music and music education. In addition he has served on the Master of Sacred Music faculties of Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota, and Trinity Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, and the music faculty of Arizona State University. He is currently College Organist-Director of Choral Activities at Carthage College in Kenosha, Wisconsin.

He has performed and led seminars for national and regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists as well as for national and regional conventions of The Hymn Society, the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM), the Presbyterian Association of Musicians (PAM) and the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA). He made his symphonic hall début as conductor-recitalist at the Meyerson in Dallas, Texas in the fall of 1999.

He is author of Singing with Understanding, a curriculum utilizing the great hymns, folksongs and spirituals of the Church to share faith stories and to teach the elements of music and worship, and composer of A New Song, a setting of the Eucharist liturgy. His numerous organ improvisations, choral octavos and handbell compositions, as well as a recording of his



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MEET YOUR BOARD MEMBERS

I played the organ before reading notes or taking lessons or even having an instrument. At about age five, the arm of a large easy chair was my keyboard. Sound and actions were provided by imagination. I loved playing then and still do now. I took time off from my arm chair playing between ages six to twelve but by twelve, I discovered note reading and the joys of playing on a real keyboard, albeit piano.

I was born and grew up in Buffalo, Minnesota. At fourteen in my home Lutheran church, I began playing our Wurlitzer electronic organ. My first postlude was from an 1895 organ book which I still have. It belonged to my grandfather who played the organ for forty years in a rural church. He died when I was two but I may have inherited his love of music and organ. Anyway, I continued playing in church through high school. I had no formal lessons then. A strong motivation and lots of practice kept me playing. I played the piano for choir in high school, sometimes sang and learned to love the classics from a wonderful repertoire of anthems and large choral works such as the *Messiah*.

I went to college at St. Cloud State University, studied piano with Ruth Gant throughout my four years there, but received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Vocal Music Education. I directed the senior choir and twice a month played the organ at Holy Cross Lutheran Church near campus during my time in St. Cloud. After teaching Grades 1-12 for one year in Cokato, Minnesota, Uncle Sam requested my presence at Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. I was drafted into the U.S. Army for two years during the Vietnam War. I received a band audition and for two years played in Army Bands at Ft. Carson, Colorado and Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. My MOS (military occupational specialty) was Piano Player. On the march, that translated "Percussion" (bass drum, cymbals, and glockenspiel). Playing the organ in church continued during military service. The organs were usually Hammonds, and the services were Interdenominational, Episcopalian and Christian Science.

I was discharged in 1970. That's the year that I joined the TCAGO. It's also the year that I became an assistant in vocal music at North Senior High School in No. St. Paul. When funding for that position disappeared, I accepted a teaching job at Maplewood Junior High School. I taught there for four years. During those years in the 1970s I also sang in the Bach Society Chorus, studied organ for three summers with Heinrich Fleischer at the U. of M, where I also took several graduate credit classes in music and education and had my first Twin Cities church job at Our Lady of Perpetual Help. I played on a three rank Kilgen organ and stayed for two years. An opening for Organist at St. Philip's Lutheran Church in Fridley became available; I played there for three years. During one of those years I studied organ at Central Lutheran with John Ferguson.

In the 1980s, I taught music at Holy Spirit School in St. Paul, gave private piano lessons and was choir director/organist at Merriam Lexington Presbyterian Church in St. Paul. I stayed with the Presbyterian Church until 1995 when I became the senior organist at First Lutheran Church in White Bear Lake. I stayed there until September of 2001.

I am currently the choir director and organist at Faith Lutheran Church in St. Paul. Sixteen years ago, I began working part time for Hennepin County Library. Library work appealed to me enough to take forty-two graduate credits in Library Science. I became a Librarian in 1998 and continue in that position at Brooklyn Park Library in Brooklyn Park. (My assignment is at the Brookdale Library in Brooklyn Center, but we're closed for renovation and won't reopen until spring of 2004.)

In July of this year, I went with a tour group connected to the University of Michigan School of Music. Marilyn Mason led our tour as we played the organs at major churches in Paris. What a thrill to play at St. Denis, St. Sulpice, St. Eustache, La Trinite, et. al.

I'm single and own a condominium in Roseville. I have interests in reading, travel, nutrition and exercise, especially swimming which I do three days a week.

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REFORMATION LUTHERAN CHURCH REBUILDS GRAND 1920'S ORGAN

In 1921, the Church of the Reformation in the Summit-Lexington area of Saint Paul built a wonderful organ for its imposing gothic sanctuary. Its open woods and fine reeds filled the large room with a glorious sound. Over the years this sound was diminished by "improvements" and general neglect. The congregation decided it was time to return the organ to its former glory and at the same time address chronic problems in the action, chests and tonal egress.

The Organ Committee consulted with most of the area builders and asked Brian Sullivan of the Obermeyer Organ Company to take on the project based on his sympathy to the sound of this large orchestral organ and his expertise with the newest organ technology.

Most of the pipework and the console are being retained. New chests and swell boxes will be installed. A new solid-state control system utilizing fiber optic technology will be used. Some ranks will be moved to result in a specification that will better serve the literature. New ranks will be added, redundant ranks and unnecessary unifications will be removed.

Come to St. Paul Reformation Lutheran Church on March 25 to hear internationally renowned organist, Dame Gillian Weir rededicate this grand example of early 20th century orchestral organ building.

FESTIVAL OF READINGS AND CAROLS

The Cathedral Choir at the Cathedral of Saint Paul will present their annual Festival of Readings and Carols on **Sunday**, **December 22** at **3:00 pm** at the Cathedral, under the direction of co-directors Marilyn and James Biery. This Festival program is unique to the Cathedral of Saint Paul and features hymns, carols and religious poetry in a departure from the

traditional Lessons and Carols. The program will be repeated on Christmas Eve before Midnight Mass, beginning at 10:45 pm.

The concert will feature John Gardner's *Tomorrow shall be my dancing day* and Paul Brandvik's arrangement of the Polish Carol, *Lulajze, Jezuniu*. Each year the Festival highlights an ethnic background represented at the Cathedral; this year celebrates the Polish members of the choir and parish by featuring this arrangement of one of the best known and beloved carols in Poland. The choir will also premiere Marilyn Biery's new setting of John Jacob Niles' *I Wonder as I Wander* for SATB, a cappella choir and soloists.

The Cathedral Choir sings music ranging from Gregorian chant to Renaissance polyphony to music of contemporary composers. Since coming to the Cathedral in 1996, the Bierys have made a commitment to feature and study repertoire at the extreme ends of Western sacred repertoire. The Choir specializes in chant and is one of only a few choirs in North America that interprets the 10th and 11th century St. Gall and Metz neumes, as a direct result of the in-depth study of chant by James Biery. At the other end of the spectrum, the Cathedral Choir will participate in the next cycle of Faith Partners, sponsored by the Composers Forum in 2003 and 2004. The Cathedral is paired with Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis and will work with a Minnesota composer commissioned by the Forum to write two pieces to be premiered by each church and two pieces for both churches.

These concerts are part of the Cathedral's outreach to the community. Concerts are free; donations are accepted. The Cathedral is handicapped accessible. For further information, contact James Biery at 651 228-1766. □

DALE WARLAND, PHILIP BRUNELLE HONORED TOGETHER AT FINAL CONCERT OF THE SIXTH WORLD CHORAL **SYMPOSIUM**

As Minnesota choruses sang farewell to the standing room only audience at Orchestra Hall at the final concert of the Sixth World Symposium on Choral Music on August 10, Philip Brunelle and Dale Warland were recognized by Chorus America and the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) with awards honoring their commitment to new choral music and its performance at the highest artistic

The awards were kept a closely guarded secret from Warland, artistic director of the Dale Warland Singers, and Brunelle, artistic director of VocalEssence – not an easy task considering that both were closely involved with organizing the evening's program. As the startled choral directors were called onto the stage they were greeted with a standing ovation. Anne Meier Baker, executive director of Chorus America, introduced them, saying, "While the two people selected for this special award have both made this region of the United States their home, their influence and the impact of their work on behalf of choral music spans the globe."

Composer Stephen Paulus, the symphony and concert representative to the ASCAP board, gave brief, but heartfelt remarks. "What a great time and place to be a living, working composer. I am happy to count these great artists not only as wonderful collaborators, but as close personal friends." Of Philip Brunelle he said, "The exciting and vibrant musicianship of Vo-calEssence has riveted audiences both far and near. From Philip you expect not only the unexpected, but the extraordinary as well." He paid tribute to Dale Warland by saying, "His insistence on perfection and that perfectly balanced sound of the Dale Warland Singers has inspired hundreds of composers and amazed audiences the world over."

Anne Meier Baker then presented each of them with beautifully engraved trophies. The inscription on each reads, "In recognition of your pioneering vision, leadership and commitment to commissioning and performing new choral

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REFLECTIONS ON THE CONGREGATIONAL SONG-2002

By Dr. Philip Steen

1. Introduction

Several years ago, a Rabbi speaking to the Breck students at chapel said, "You do not know who you are until you hear the stories about yourself." And most of us know the importance of learning some of the great texts to read or sing in the Jewish tradition as we enter adulthood. Last year I attended a small Evangelical Covenant (Swedish) church on the West Coast. The music leadership was a husband-wife team (early 20s) accompanied by a keyboard player and a drummer (even younger). The words were projected on a screen, but the location of the screen was such that not all of the congregation could see the words. For that "style," it was performed well. After the service, the male singer and leader asked what I thought of the music. I said to the song leader, "When do the people in the congregation get the opportunity to sing some of the great texts from your tradition? How about some of the wonderful Swedish hymns that are part of the heritage of your church? Your keyboard person could play the hymns on the piano." He replied, "But I do not know those hymns." And I replied, "But you can and are learning new music which you then perform on Sunday. How about learning some of the traditional hymns?" I remembered the words, "You do not know who you are until you hear stories about yourself." Many of those stories are in the congregational songs. As an example, some of the Wesley hymns deal with social issues, etc.

Where are we??

- 1. Traditional hymn repertoire is not known by many of the younger people returning to the church. Therefore those returning to the church bring "their" music that they know. Several years ago, I gathered some of the children at St. Paul's where I was organist-choirmaster to sing some carols at Christmas, *Away in the Manger*, etc. I found out that they did not know what I considered "traditional" carols, and I had to teach the carols to the children. We used to be able to count on the children learning the carols in school. Not so anymore. At a local Rotary meeting it was reported to me that the local high school basketball team visiting the meeting stood quietly while the Rotarians sang *God Bless America*. They did not know the song.
- 2. As professionals, are we really careful that the hymns chosen are appropriate for the lectionary for the day, related to the lessons and sermon? During most of the contemporary services which I have attended, I do not hear music using scriptural texts or texts expressing some of the great faith journeys. The great prayer life of David was so important to the early Calvinistic churches. Most hymnals contain wonderful settings of the 23rd Psalm that could be sung on Good Shepherd Sunday. And when are the people able to stand up and sing *A Mighty Fortress is our Good* (Luther) or

Thou Hidden Source of Calm Repose (Wesley)?

- 3. As professionals, are we making, with our accompaniments, the congregational song interesting to sing?
- 4. Are we bringing into the service some of the newer congregational hymns that speak a more contemporary language? Texts by Brian Wren? Do we include some of the contemporary-style hymns?
- 5. I attended a concert of a church's Praise Choir: a lead singer with guitar, bass guitar player, pianist, percussionist, a backup choir and trumpet players who performed on some pieces. They really performed well. At St. Paul's Church on the Hill where I was organist-choirmaster for nineteen years, I think I was the only one who played guitar, and that was folk style. There were just not the resources to put together a group to accompany the "praise" style music.
- 6. It seems younger people are not comfortable using their voices singing the style needed for the traditional hymns, especially males. However they can imitate the "contemporary" sound really well.
- 7. Is the "contemporary" style music appropriate for the worship in your church?

I would like to suggest that our professionals take a leadership role in enhancing the congregational song. This could be done in a variety of ways:

- 1. Make sure hymn singing is part of the educational program at our churches, especially beginning with the younger children. Most Sunday schools have a published curriculum, and hymns could be chosen to fit with the topic. Even offer to provide an accompanist.
- 2. Many music directors presently include a short paragraph about the hymns in the bulletin. Wonderful! There are many resources to find this information. What can be done to enhance the understanding of the text? At the Basilica at the September 11th remembrance service, the opening hymn had a new text, "When life becomes a nightmare that will not go away. And evil seems to triumph and hatred rules the day...." What a great text (new) to have the packed-to-overflowing congregation sing. How about having the congregation hear aloud together the text prior to singing the hymn?
- 3. Hymn of the Month introducing a new hymn to the congregation. On the first Sunday of the month, the choir could sing the hymn as an introit. On the 2nd Sunday, one of the anthems might be a setting of the hymn. On the 3rd Sunday the congregation could sing the hymn. Use prelude and postlude settings of the hymn tune.
 - 4. Use hymn settings for anthems that include a verse for the congregation. As an example:

Love Divine, All Loves Excelling, arr. Van Camp. Publisher: Augsburg; SATB, organ, handbells. Congregation joins on the last verse.

Upon this Rock, by John Ness Beck. SATB, organ, optional brass; Publisher: G. Schirmer. Setting concludes with first verse of **The Church's one foundation**....

Once in Royal David's City, arr. by Proulx; Publisher: Augsburg; SATB, organ. Verse 4 has a descant, and the setting concludes with a special accompaniment.

5. Use interesting introductions and have the choir sing a descant. There are several good books with effective accompaniments to the hymn.

Free Organ Accompaniments, by T. Tertius Noble; Publisher: J. Fischer & Brothers **Hymn Harmonizations, Books 1-5**, by John Ferguson; Publisher: Ludwig Music

- 6. Include interesting settings of hymns from all styles, including "contemporary."
- 7. Good acoustics will aid in enhancing the singing. Are there ways to improve the acoustics in the worship space? Is the accompanying instrument adequate?

We all know the wonderful Old Testament texts, **Praise God** with trumpet sound...Let everything that breathes praise the Lord. Hymn singing was an important part of the Calvinistic church, singing the unison psalms of David. There are newspaper articles reporting that in New England during the 1700s singing contests occurred between churches. Let's work to make the congregational song vital and exciting. Let everything that breathes praise the Lord. □



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NEW CONTEST-WINNING CHRISTMAS CAROLS GREET THE HOLIDAY SEASON

The American Composers Forum and VocalEssence, founded as the Plymouth Music Series, are pleased to announce the winners of the fifth annual **Welcome Christmas! Carol Contest**. This year's winning composers are Mary Lynn Place Badarak of Atlanta, Georgia for *Brightest and Best* and Paul

Lohman of Minneapolis for a new setting of *Angels We Have Heard on High*. Each composer receives an award of \$1000. The new Christmas carols will be premiered at the VocalEssence **Welcome Christmas!** concerts on **December 8, 14 and 15** at Plymouth Congregational Church in Minneapolis. 
"Each year we give composers a unique challenge in composing a carol – this year it was to write for voices and percussion. What sparkling, shimmering sounds could a composer find that would add a fresh touch to a new carol?" asks Philip Brunelle, artistic director of VocalEssence, adding, "Our hope is that these carols will find homes in the libraries of choirs across the country. Judging by the quality of submissions I believe this will happen." The two winning carols were chosen from among 68 submitted from across America, representing 28 states.

Mary Lynn Place Badarak chose a hymn-text written in 1811 by Reginald Heber for her carol, giving it a charming, playful new melody. "Brightest and Best is actually an Epiphany carol, and as I'm composer-in-residence at the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany in Atlanta, I've been mulling over a new setting for quite a while," she says. "Previously the words were set to the Sacred Harp tune 'Star of the East' in a minor key, which I found rather dark and dour. The contest really inspired me to write a new setting to meet the contest requirements. The idea of using bells and percussion added lightness and brightness. Once I decided what I wanted to do with the text, the music simply wrote itself."

Paul Lohman's new melody for *Angels We Have Heard on High* is accented with a tam tam (Chinese gong) and four cymbals of various timbres. "It's a fast and joyous carol. The percussionists will play the cymbals with mallets, creating an effect like the fluttering of angel wings," according to the composer. Philip Brunelle describes the carol as a fresh departure. "Many arrangements of 'Angels We Have Heard on High' begin loudly and stay that way. Paul Lohman's is unusual in that it begins very softly with four cymbals followed by the chorus singing as softly as possible. It gradually builds but always keeps a gentle, atmospheric sound that gives a different understanding to the text."

The concerts will be recorded and the new carols will be featured in the 2003 national broadcast of **Welcome Christmas!** produced by Minnesota Public Radio and distributed by Public Radio International.

Based in St. Paul, The American Composers Forum supports composers at all stages of their careers through granting, commissioning and performance programs. Founded in 1969 as the Plymouth Music Series, VocalEssence explores the interaction of voices and instruments through innovative programming of music, past and present.
