THE RUSSIAN'S TALE: An 'Unknown' Organ Repertoire

hen we imagine music in the Russian Church, our minds are filled with the sound of resplendent unaccompanied choral singing. But we do not think of organ music since, after all, the Russian Orthodox liturgy specifically excludes instruments. Without traditional church patronage, the usual support mechanism for organs and organ music would seem to be lacking in Russia.

Yet, surprise, there IS Russian organ music, and our TCAGO guest in March, recitalist and teacher Daniel Zaretsky from Saint Petersburg (formerly Leningrad, formerly Saint Petersburg...), will introduce us to this largely little-known yet fascinating realm.

Come out for the concert and bring a friend....FRIDAY, March 12, 2004 beginning 7:30 pm at Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church (511 Groveland Avenue, Minneapolis, across from the Walker, a block south of St. Mark's Cathedral). Don Livingston is our host. Free parking is available in the church lot immediately adjacent the rear entrance (access it from the Groveland driveway or from the Lyndale exit of west-bound I-94).

Born in Leningrad in 1964, **Daniel Zaretsky** studied piano and organ performance at the Leningrad State Conservatorym where he completed his Concert Diploma and Teaching Certificate in 1989 under the direction of Professors E.Bazanov and N.Oksentjan. Postgraduate education followed at the Kazan State Conservatory under

Professor R. Abdoullin. From 1991 to 1993, Zaretsky studied further at the Sibelius Music Academy in Helsinki with Professor Kari Jussila, graduating with the Concert Diploma with honours. In addition he has supplemented his studies in several masterclasses in Western Europe, including those of Guy Bovet, Marie-Claire Alain, Harald Vogel, Ludger Lohmann, Jean Guillou, David Sanger, Hans Fagius, Michael Radulescu, Daniel Roth and Peter Planyavsky.

Daniel Zaretsky has performed since 1988 in all

the former Soviet Union's important venues, including the Philharmonic Halls of Moscow, St. Petersburg and the Cathedral of Riga, as well as in Czechoslovakia, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Austria, Finland, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, France, Great Britain, Spain, South America, Israel and the

STEWART WAYNE FOSTER PLAYS AT ST. THOMAS

Stewart Wayne Foster, concert organist, will present a guest organ recital in the St. Thomas Aquinas Chapel on the campus of the University of St. Thomas on **March 15** at **8:15pm**.

Stewart Wayne Foster is the winner of the first Dallas International Organ Competition in 1997, held at the Meyerson Symphony Center, which carried the largest prize ever awarded to an organ competitor. Not only did an international panel of distinguished judges award Mr. Foster the top prize, but the capacity audience in attendance also voted to give Mr. Foster the "Prize of the Audience." The Dallas competition is the largest, but not the only competition Mr. Foster has won. In 1986 he won first place in the Undergraduate Organ Playing Competition sponsored by First Presbyterian Church in Ottumwa, Iowa and then in 1987 he won the American Guild of Organists' Regional Competition in Augusta, Georgia. That same year, he was awarded second place in the Open Organ Competition in Fort Wayne, Indiana and in 1988 was a finalist in the American Guild of Organists' National Organ Playing Competition held in Houston. In 1996 he was awarded first prize in the William Hall Pipe Organ Competition held in San Antonio. Many of Stewart Wayne Foster's formative years were spent in France, where in 1990 he was awarded admission to the well-respected French music conser-

vatory, L'Ecole Normale Superieure de Musique de Paris. Out of nine applicants of different nationalities, Mr. Foster was chosen to occupy one of the two spaces available during the 1990-91 academic year and was admitted to the class of Suzanne Chaisemartin, herself a student and disciple of Marcel Dupré. After a year's study he received the highly-coveted Diplôme de Concertiste by playing a major recital in the Church of St. Augustine in Paris after which the jury awarded Mr. Foster the Premier Prix de Virtuosité. From 1991-1995, Mr. Foster performed regularly in Paris and the French prov-

inces. His recital at La Madeleine in Paris brought rave reviews as did his performance during the music festival in St. Yrieix, where Mr. Foster was described as "a young musician that already exhibits a seductive flair that will permit him to rapidly take his place among the top in his field." During his time in Paris he was

United States (this is his first visit to Minnesota). In 1991 he won the National Organ Competition and took Third Prize in the Speyer International Organ Competition in Germany. In 1990 he was a finalist in the International Organ Competition in Ragusa, Italy, and in 1993 in Lahti, Finland. He has also made recordings for Russian, Latvian, Swiss, German and Danish radios. At the moment Zaretsky is organist of the famous St. Petersburg Philharmonic Hall, and teaches organ at the St. Petersburg Conservatory. Since 2002 he has also taught organ at the Nizhnij Novgorod State Conservatory, the third-largest conservatory in Russia.

His Minnesota program will include works by Georgij Catoire (1861-1926), Sergej Tanejew (1856-1915), Piotr Tschaikovskij (1840-1893), Cesar Cui (1835-1918), Christophor Kuschnarew (1890-1960), Gennadij Belov (b.1939), Sergej Prokofieff (1891-1953), Georgij Muschel (b.1909), Alfred Schnittke (1936-1996), and Ernst Kaehler (1799-1847). □

ORGANIST STEPHEN HAMILTON PERFORMS AT WAYZATA COMMUNITY CHURCH

Virtuoso concert organist Stephen Hamilton, with Diana Lee Lucker, narrator, will perform Marcel Dupré's *Le Chemin de la Croix* (The Stations of the Cross) on **March 16** at **7:30 pm** at Wayzata Community Church. In this epic dramatic work, the 14 great *Le Chemin de la Croix* poems by Paul Claudel are read, and each poem is followed by Dupré's musical meditation on its symbolic motifs. This free performance, featuring the church's majestic 70-rank, four-manual tracker pipe organ, is offered to the community through its *Music at Wayzata* public concert series.

Paul Claudel (1868-1955), French poet, dramatist, essayist and theologian, wrote *Le Chemin de la Croix* in 1911. Using the framework of the Stations of the Cross, the poetry is an extended reflection on the passion and death of Jesus, infusing His human anguish with rich spiritual meaning. The first musical

sketch of Le Chemin de la Croix was conceived and realized in 1931 by renowned French composer and organist Marcel Dupré (1886-1971), in the form of an improvisation at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Brussels. The audience's expression of regret that this spontaneous work would never be repeated per-

suaded Dupré to reconstruct his improvisations, and *Le Chemin de la Croix* is now considered one of the great French programmatic works for the organ.

Organist Stephen Hamilton has long been prominent on the American organ scene. He recorded *Le Chemin de la Croix* for Arkay Records at the Cathedral Church of St. Mark in Minneapolis in 1991. For the past 30 years, critical acclaim has earned Hamilton a reputation as an engaging and popular artist. He has amassed an extensive record of performances on concert stages, in major church sanctuaries and on radio and television throughout the United States. Hamilton is Minister of Music at the historic Church of the Holy Trinity (Episcopal) in New York City, where he conducts the Holy Trinity Choir and is Artistic Director of *Music at Holy Trinity*, the church's subscription concert series, which has been hailed by the New York Times as "an important venue for weekend presentations."

Assistant Organist of the American Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in Paris. In 1995, Stewart Wayne Foster returned to the United States to pursue a Master's degree in harpsichord and early music at the University of North Texas in Denton, where he studied with Dr. Lenora McCroskey. Mr. Foster was awarded a teaching fellowship at the university, was the recipient of the university's Helen Hewitt Memorial Scholarship, and took his master's degree there with honors.

A native of Melbourne, Florida, Mr. Foster began his organ studies with Martha Root. During his teen years, he studied with Jack Jones and Robert Hebble and completed his high school education by the age of 17 at the Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan where he studied organ with Robert Murphy and piano with Charles Ashe. He then entered the Stetson University School of Music in 1985 as an early admissions student and recipient of a Tinsley Scholarship. There he studied organ with Paul Jenkins and Murray Somerville and graduated in 1990 with a Bachelor of Music degree with a minor in French.

As a winner of the Dallas Competition, Mr. Foster has been featured as orchestral soloist and solo recitalist in numerous appearances in concert halls and churches throughout the United States. He performed the world premiere of Lux Perpetua by the Pulitzer Prize winning composer Samuel Adler with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra as part of his competition prize. In July 1999 he performed a solo recital to great critical acclaim in Chartres Cathedral as part of the International Organ Festival held there every summer. His first CD recording of French Symphonic Organ Literature was released in January 2000 on the Towerhill label. In addition to his career as recitalist, Mr. Foster is Director or Music and Senior Organist at historic First (Scots) Presbyterian Church in Charleston, South Carolina. He is Coordinator of the Piccolo Spoleto Organ Series which takes place every May in Charleston as part of the famed Spoleto Festival.

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

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TCAGO EXECUTIVE BOARD REDUCES CONTRIBUTION TO PIPEDREAMS

There probably is not a single AGO member, local or nationwide, who does not recognize the huge contribution Michael Barone and *Pipedreams* have made to the organ, it's history and literature, and certainly to us as organists on both a local and worldwide level. Thus, it was with greatest reluctance that, based on the advice of TCAGO Treasurer, David Geslin, our chapter Executive Board unanimously voted to reduce our chapter's contribution to Pipedreams from \$5000 to \$3000. In no way should the Board's action be taken as an act of turning our backs on Michael Barone as a prophet in his homeland. The fact is that, despite any protestations to the contrary, the money TCAGO has to spend does not go as far as it used to. In addition, our revenues have not kept pace with our expenses. Where to cut, which areas to sacrifice, which to support, and at what level are all the responsibility of the Executive Board, and we felt this was a prudent, albeit painful decision.

The decision was made at the Executive Board's January meeting, and the Board also moved that TCAGO members be encouraged to support *Pipedreams* with private contributions. If 100 members chose to make \$10 contributions to *Pipedreams*, we could make up the amount no longer donated by our local chapter. Norrby Medal in 1993. He was appointed Professor of Music at the University College of Music in Piteå and was voted 2003 "Choir Leader of the Year" by the national association of Swedish Choirs.

The Global Percussion Network, a trio of keyed percussionists under the direction of Anders Aastrand, will accompany the choir on a portion of the program and will perform *Nattetid* ('Night time'), a solo offering composed by Aastrand. The group's undulating rhythms integrate jazz and New Age impulses to create sympathetic waves in both the performers and their audiences.

The program focuses on Swedish music spanning the most refined choral lyricism of the Romantic period to exciting rhythmic choral-percussion settings of newly composed works. Works (including pieces by Pärt, Olsson, Sandström, Åstrand, Jennefelt) will be sung in Latin, Swedish and English. The group has pioneered indigenous inspired choral literature based on Laplander (Saami) folksongs (the "joik"). Their comprehensive chorale smorgasbord of contemporary Swedish choral music promises to mesmerize music lovers of all ages and persuasions.

SWEDISH CHOIR PERFORMS AT CENTRAL LUTHERAN

One of Scandinavia's most interesting and well-traveled choirs, the Erik Westberg Vocal Ensemble of Piteå, Sweden will present a concert at Central Lutheran Church (333 South Twelfth Street in downtown Minneapolis) on **Monday**, **March 8** at **7:30 pm**. The choir, made up of 16 singers, was founded in 1993 and is made up of active soloists, church musicians and music teachers from the northern Swedish counties of Norrbotten and Västerbotten. The ensemble has toured widely under the patronage of Queen Silvia of Sweden. In addition to the United States concert, venues have included France, Brazil, Iceland, Finland, Norway, Denmark, Great Britain, Canada, Australia, China and Japan. It began the international celebration "Choral Singing for Peace and Justice" on Tonga and Samoa during the 2000 millennium celebration.

Conductor Erik Westberg has won wide international acclaim both through touring with his groups and serving as guest conductor and artist-in-residence. A conducting student of the renowned Eric Ericksson, Westberg won the coveted Johannes


