

Every year the Professional Development Committee reviews the Salary Guidelines for organists in the Twin Cities. Upon their recommendation, the Executive Board approved a 3% salary increase to take effect in May 2006. The new fee schedule will be included in the June "Pipenotes."

The election of officers is taking place this month. If you did not receive a ballot in the mail, please contact Barb Herzog as soon as possible. It is important that you return the completed ballot as soon as you can. Any ballots received after the deadline will not be counted.

The Executive Board approved giving a \$100 gift certificate for purchasing music to the third place person. We owe our thanks to Dee Ann Crossley for her wonderful work with this competition!

One of our own esteemed colleagues, Jim Frazier, has written a biography of Maurice Duruflé entitled Maurice Duruflé: The Man and His Music with a Commentary on the 'Requiem.' It will be published soon by the University Rochester Press as part of the Eastman Studies in Music. Jim has received no funding for this project which he considered "a labor of love." In order to reduce production costs which will also reduce the cost to the purchaser of the book, the Executive Board voted to donate a subvention of \$1,500 towards publication. As a result, TCAGO would be given credit in the book. The decision was made because we are not soliciting composition commissions until after the convention. We are indeed proud to have one of our own with such a great achievement!

Heinrich Fleischer University Organist and Professor Emeritus of Music University of Minnesota 1912-2006

The musical world lost an important figure with the passing of the noted concert organist Dr. Heinrich Fleischer on 28 February 2006 at age 93. A direct descendant of Martin Luther, Rudolf Heinrich Fleischer was born on 1 April 1912 in Eisenach, Germany, J. S. Bach's birthplace, and attended the same Latin school as did Luther and Bach. Studies in Weimar, Jena, and Leipzig earned him a diploma in Church Music from the Leipzig Conservatory in 1934, and the Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Leipzig in 1939.

Decisive influences on Fleischer's musical development include the organist and pedagogue Karl Straube (1873-1950), who held the position of Cantor at the St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, the same post J. S. Bach held in the eighteenth century. In 1937 Fleischer was appointed to the faculty of the Leipzig Conservatory, and in 1941 he was drafted into the German Army. He served in the Signal Corps in the Soviet Union until 1943; a severe motor accident ending his military service. In 1948 Fleischer left Leipzig and found asylum in Ravensburg, West Germany, and he subsequently emi-

grated to the United States at the invitation of Valparaiso University, where he held a professorship in music from 1949 until 1957. While at Valparaiso, Fleischer also served as organist of the Rockefeller Chapel at the University of Chicago. He became an American citizen in 1957 and joined the University of Minnesota faculty in 1959, becoming the fifth University Organist in Minnesota's history. He taught in the Music Department and School of Music under directors Paul Oberg, Roy Schuessler, and Lloyd Ultan, until his retirement in 1982. In Minneapolis, Fleischer served as the organist for Grace University Lutheran Church, and later for the First Unitarian Society.

Fleischer's artistic reputation was principally dependent on his stature as a disciple of Straube, himself a friend and associate of the composer Max Reger (1873-1916), and considered one of the most important pedagogical figures in German church music in the early 20th century. Through Fleischer's pedagogy, many American organists were exposed to performing and interpretive philosophies that were the direct consequence of customs and traditions of both the late Romantic era and the early 20th-century neoclassical movements in organ and church music reform. An active editor and composer, Fleischer edited a series of volumes of liturgical organ music under the title The Parish Organist for Concordia Publishing House, as well as works of Bach, Handel, Mozart, Michael Praetorius, and Samuel Scheidt. A devoted scholar of the organ music of J. S. Bach, Fleischer's unpublished editions include one of Bach's Art of Fugue, as well as an organ instruction method.

In 1990 the *Heinrich Fleischer Collection*, consisting of Dr. Fleischer's books, scores, and papers, was established at the library of Martin Luther College New Ulm, Minnesota. In 2002, a festschrift entitled <u>Perspectives on Organ Playing and Musical Interpretation</u>, prepared by a committee of former students, was published by Martin Luther College in honor of Fleischer's 90th birthday. On the occasion of the festschrift's presentation, the University of Minnesota School of Music designated a Centennial scholarship to be named for Fleischer.

Heinrich Fleischer is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Monica and Eugene Kelly, and two granddaughters, Mia and Amy, of Plymouth, Minnesota; his son and daughter-in-law, Peter and Virginia Fleischer of Pass Christian, Mississippi; and his brother, Konrad Fleischer, together with a nephew and grandnephew, as well as nieces and grandnieces, all living in Germany. He is moreover remembered by countless students, colleagues, and friends. At his request, no services are being planned. A future memorial concert at the University of Minnesota will be announced.


Gregorian Permutations: A Sacred Concert

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

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
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HEINRICH FLEISCHER 1912 – 2006

Dr. Heinrich Fleischer, noted organist and teacher, died on February 28, 2006, in Crystal, Minn., a Minneapolis suburb, at the age of 93. The cause of death was the result of respiratory complications following the flu. At his death, Fleischer was Emeritus Professor of Music at the University of Minnesota.

Heinrich Fleischer was born April 1, 1912, in Eisenach, Germany. A direct descendant of Martin Luther, he studied at the same Latin school where both Luther and

J.S. Bach had earlier attended. Fleischer's keyboard instructors were Rudolf Mauersberger in Eisenach and Michael Schneider in Weimar. Thereafter he studied with Karl Straube, the Thomaskantor, who was the preeminent German organist and teacher of his time. In 1937, at age 25, Fleischer was called back by Straube to join the Leipzig Academy organ faculty. At the same time he became University Organist at the historic Paulinerkirche, where he played a series of three inaugural recitals to critical acclaim. During the period of his Leipzig appointments, he was active as editor, lecturer at church and musicological conferences, and choral conductor. He received his Ph.D. in musicology from Leipzig University in 1939 with a dissertation on the 18th century Dresden composer, Christlieb Siegmund Binder.

In 1941, during World War II, Fleischer was drafted into the German Army. He served in the Signal Corps in the Soviet Union until 1943, when a severe auto accident ended his military service.

In 1948 Fleischer left Leipzig and found asylum in Ravensburg, West Germany. A short time later he moved to America, and in 1949 accepted a visiting professorship at Valparaiso University. While still teaching at Valparaiso, he became University Organist at Rockefeller Chapel on the University of Chicago campus. His recitals at the chapel, played on the large E.M. Skinner organ, were well-received. Perhaps a highpoint was reached with his performance of Bach's *Clavierübung III*, a work that in the 50s was infrequently played in its entirety.

Fleischer became a United States citizen in 1957. In America, Fleischer's professional life was marked by an even greater activity than that of his German period. He published a number of annotated practical editions of 17th and 18th century organ masters, and launched the popular and influential *Parish Organist* series. With Valparaiso, Chicago, or later Minneapolis as his home base, he became a prolific "concertizing organist," touring the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the Gulf of Mexico north into Canada, presenting hundreds of organ recitals. In addition, he refined and deepened his approach to the performance of Bach, Reger, and contemporary composers such as Johann Nepomuk David. An unpublished *Organ Method*, which explores organ technique in new and valuable directions, attests to his pedagogical wisdom and acumen.

Fleischer's tenure at the University of Minnesota covered the years from 1959-82. Significant performances during this time included those of Reger's op. 73 and Bach's *Art of Fugue* (unpublished edition), both of which he repeated in various venues throughout the country. Together with his teaching and duties as University Organist, Fleischer held church organist positions at Grace University Lutheran Church and later, after 1968, at the First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis.


In 1990, during his retirement years, the *Heinrich Fleischer Collection* was established in the Martin Luther College Library, New Ulm, Minn. Here can be found his books, annotated performing scores, recital programs and reviews, unpublished writings, and other materials related to his life and career. Prominent items in the collection include *Heinrich Fleischer: the Organist's Calling and the Straube Tradition*, a University of Minnesota Ph.D. dissertation, 1989, by Kathryn Schenk; and *Perspectives on Organ Playing and Musical Interpretation: A Festschrift for Heinrich Fleischer at 90*, published in 2002 by a committee of former students (available from the *Organ Historical Society*).

Heinrich Fleischer's professional life reveals a man who understood the rich heritage into which he had been born, and who was able to transform it into a viable and living legacy. It is a testimony to his memory that today his students, and, in turn, their students, are adhering to his teaching and performance goals, and are actively championing excellence in the art of organ playing.

Heinrich Fleischer is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Monica and Eugene Kelly, and two granddaughters, Mia and Amy, of Plymouth, Minn.; his son and daughter-in-law, Peter and Virginia Fleischer of Pass Christian, Miss.; and his brother, Konrad Fleischer, together with a nephew and grandnephew, as well as nieces and grandnieces, all living in Germany.


On May 12, 2006, at 7:30 pm, Dr. Trapp will perform a recital of music from the CD recording including Psalm Preludes Set II: Psalm 33, vs. 3 by Herbert Howells; Amazing Grace and Middlebury by George Shearing; Pisgah by Dale Wood; Variations on "Christe Sanctorum" by Lynn Trapp; Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier (Blessed Jesus, We Are Here) and Trio: Herr Jesu Christ, dich zu uns wend' BWV 655 by J. S. Bach; Moderato in F, from Three Tone Pieces for Organ, Opus 22 by Niels Gade; Impromptu from Pièces de Fantaisie by Louis Vierne; Variations on a Norwegian Folktune by Bjarne Slogedal; and Easter Sequence: Victimae Paschali Laudes (Christians, Praise the Paschal Victim) by Dom Paul Benoit, O.S.B. Also preformed at the recital, but not on the CD, will be Images of the Exsultet Chant of the Great Paschal Vigil by Lynn Trapp. This piece was commissioned by the Cathedral of St. Patrick, New York City, in 2005, and is inspired by the Exsultet chant proclaimed in the Easter Vigil liturgy of the Roman Catholic Church.

The Lively-Fulcher organ was constructed and installed by Lively-Fulcher Organbuilders of Alexandria, VA in 2001. It has 61 stops and 67 ranks (49 independent registers) playable over five divisions, Grand Orgue, Récit Expressif, Positif Expressif, Bombarde and Pedale. The tonal inspiration for the instrument is firmly based in 19th century France but is designed and voiced with a broad literature base in mind. This instrument is not meant as a copy of any one style, nor is it intended to be a collection of styles trying to do everything,

but rather - through its unique scaling, voicing and balancing - is intended to be a modern instrument of the 21st century speaking with its own voice.

Dr. Lynn Trapp holds a distinguished career as concert organist, conductor, composer, liturgist and recording artist and has gained a national and international reputation for his work. Lynn is an active recitalist and has performed for churches, cathedrals, and universities in many major cities of the U.S. and Europe, including regional and national conventions. With more than 50 publication titles to his name, his keyboard and choral music is published by seven major publishers.. His commissions have been premiered in many prestigious places including the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC, St. Patrick's Cathedral, NYC and by professional ensembles such as the Kansas City Chorale.


