A Tribute to Biggsy! TCAGO **Members Concert Celebrates** Famous Organist September 11, 2006—7:30 PM

Plymouth Congregational Church (Holtkamp organ) 1900 Nicollet Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minnesota

Probably more than any other single individual, the late, great E. Power Biggs awakened a broad American public interest in the sound and repertoire of historic European pipe organs. Through concerts, recordings and radio broadcasts from @1930-1980,

Biggs championed 'classical' organ music and made the notion of 'mechanical-action' pipe organs trendy.

To celebrate his memory in his 'centenary year' (b. 3/29/1906), members of the Twin Cities chapter of the American Guild of Organists (TCAGO) will present a free public concert of varied and colorful music connected to 'Biggsy's' career and drawn from his numerous published editions. Repertoire will include compositions drawn from six centuries, from John Dunstable (15th c.) to Charles Ives (20th c.). Among the participating players are **Anne Phillips** (Christ the King Lutheran, Bloomington), Andrew Hackett (Hennepin Avenue United Methodist, Minneapolis), Timothy Strand (University Lutheran Church of Hope, Minneapolis), Sharon Currie (Saint Paul), Lynn Trapp (St. Olaf Catholic Church, Minneapolis), and Michael Barone (Minnesota Public Radio).

Prizewinning recitalist, improviser and composer **Aaron David Miller** (newly appointed to Good Shepherd Lutheran, Minneapolis) will make his TCAGO debut playing Mozart's Adagio and Fugue in C-minor, K. 546, a Biggs specialty. Dee Ann Crossley (Augustana Lutheran, West Saint Paul) will conclude the concert with the crowd-pleasing Variations on "America" by Charles Ives, 'discovered' by Biggs during a visit to the composer's home.

The featured instrument is a 89-rank 1980 Holtkamp pipe organ, a particularly characterful representative of this famous American builder's work.

Dean's Column



Greetings to all!

Thank you for electing me Dean of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and thanks to all of you who have written or called with congratulations. I am honored and very glad to begin this term of service to

our chapter. With the 2008 National Convention coming to the Twin Cities, we are facing a time of tremendous activity, engagement and growth potential for our membership. Your new executive board had its first meeting on July 26. What a talented, energetic group of people you have representing you! The program committee has a great calendar planned for the season; I look forward to seeing you at the kick-off event, a Member's Recital September 11, at Plymouth Church. It will be fun to hear our colleagues play, meet new people and greet longtime friends after the summer break.

One of the highlights of my summer was an 18-day vacation in Italy. I want to tell you about the day my pride and my humility collided in Florence. We had seen Michelangelo's great "David" and several of his other incredible pieces at the Cappelle Medicee. I don't want to be like one of the forgotten painters or works of art that we quickly passed by in countless Italian gallery rooms or church apses. That is my pride. My humility is my acute awareness that I am not on the same tier as Michelangelo. Nor am I on the tier below that, or the one below that for many times over.

Upon returning to Minneapolis I was talking about this with my pastor as we were doing our worship planning for the year. We happened to be overlooking his backyard garden at the time, and I commented on how pretty the peonies were. He said that their garden was just one small garden, but that they enjoyed it very much, and somehow, with all the other gardens in town it helped make Minneapolis a beautiful city. He also told me that if I picked a single flower, it would not be perfect. It did, however, play an important part in the whole.

2007 Student Scholarship Competition

Students will be performing on the newly-installed 51-rank, 3-manual Schantz organ. The instrument has electropneumatic action and full memory system with MIDI. Competitors must be under 23 years of age as of August 1, 2007 and must reside (either home or school) in AGO Region VI: Minnesota, lowa, Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Colorado or eastern Wyoming. Membership in the AGO is not required.



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This instrument, in a small bedroom in my townhouse, has provided hours of enjoyment without bothering the neighbors. Currently it takes up a space 7'9" deep, 10' wide and 7'6" tall. If the instrument were to be fully assembled with the included casework, it would require 8' 9" for ceiling height. The sound is very clear with nice chiff and not tiring at all. The façade pipes are of Oak and Tin. The key action is mechanical and the stop action is electric.



The internationally acclaimed organ virtuoso Thomas Heywood enjoys an outstanding reputation as one of the world's finest concert organists. As the first and only Australian musician in history to live as a professional concert organist, 32 year-old Heywood is renowned for his truly unique ability to make the greatest music of all time come alive on the King of Instruments. Touring extensively around the world, Heywood has an amazingly comprehensive repertoire of over 5,000 works. He is celebrated as "an acknowledged master" for his solo performances and spoken introductions. Also a talented and prolific transcriber, his solo concert organ arrangements of the most famous classical and romantic music are published for world-wide distribution. Heywood is also performing and recording his arrangements of the complete Beethoven symphonies for concert organ solo, becoming the first solo artist in history to successfully perform these musical landmarks.

Heywood regularly inaugurates new and restored organs. In 2001 he performed the opening solo concert on the largest musical instrument in the southern hemisphere – the Grand Concert Organ in the Melbourne Town Hall. Since 1992 when he released Australia's best-selling organ recording at only 18 years of age, Heywood's many recordings have all been popular sell-out successes receiving extraordinary critical acclaim. Heywood's performances have been broadcast internationally on television and radio.

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
