




Heinrich Fleischer Remembered

he first anniversary of the passing of Dr. Heinrich Fleischer (1912-2006) will be commemorated in a special organ recital given by a number of Fleischer's former students on Sunday, March 11, at **4:00 pm** at the First Unitarian Society, 900 Mount Curve Avenue, in Minneapolis.



An important figure in the musical world and one of the best known organists and pedagogues in Minnesota's history, Dr. Fleischer was University Organist and Professor of Music at the University of Minnesota from 1959 until 1982 and was, for several years, the organist at the First Unitarian Society. The recital will be given on the Society's Holtkamp organ, upon which Fleischer performed regularly.

The performers, all former students of Dr. Fleischer at the University, are Ames Anderson, Leonard Danek, Laura Edman, Steve Gentile, Nancy Lancaster, Allan Mahnke and Kathryn Moen. The program, focusing on works the performers studied with Dr. Fleischer, will include music by J. S. Bach, W. A. Mozart, Johannes Brahms, Paul Hindemith and Leonard Danek.

The program is co-sponsored by the TCAGO, First Unitarian Society and the University of Minnesota. Please join us as we remember and celebrate Dr. Fleischer through the work of these performers. □

Dean's Column



Greetings to All,

My church, Westminsterster Presbyterian -Minneapolis, is celebrating its sesquicentennial in 2007. As part of our liturgical observance of the same, we are devoting the last Sunday of each month to a past decade. In January our order of service, the hymns, and the anthems were representative of the 1970s.

The last Sunday of February will have a 50s flair; in March we will be looking to the 30s. By summer we will have made a few quantum leaps and will be back in the 1850s. It's been very interesting perusing old bulletins. The hymns we chose for our 1970's service were among the most frequently sung at Westminster during the decade that saw the passage of the ERA, Roe vs. Wade, the Vietnam War, and WPC's first woman clergy: "Once to Every Man and Nation, He Who Would Valiant Be, O Brother Man." Needless to say, gender inclusivity was addressed in the new hymnal following all that social change!

The 50's service will have the doxology up front and the sermon at the end as was the practice then. With the passage of 50 years we can see what anthems and organ repertoire have withstood the test of time, and we can see which composers and pieces have fallen by the way. For me, one of the most telling and amusing things to surface was an oft used quote on the bulletin covers:

"Private worship should begin the moment the church is entered. Corporate worship begins with the sound of the first organ note."

So they had that problem back then, too! It's both reassuring and discouraging to know that.

Do you face chatter every time you begin your prelude? Are you being heard? Are you expressing something worth listening to? Do you still believe that your music is important for others to hear? How do you address this in your situation? We have done everything from signs outside the Sanctuary doors, to notes in the bulletin, to our current practice of sounding a chime and extending a welcome before the prelude begins. I would be interested to learn how you keep "acoustical integrity" around your preludes. All I can say is, "Oh, Brother! Be Valiant, for Once to Every Organist comes the moment to play!"

Therein is my gladness...that every seven days we have the chance yet again to offer the best of our abilities in rendering music from one of the most vast repertoires created for any instrument. We have a built in "audience" of people gathered by choice to a higher purpose, and we have the support of a guild whose members share our very concerns. So, come to the AGO events. Be inspired by the concerts, learn from the workshops, commiserate with your peers and support the profession. They will be looking at your bulletins fifty years hence!

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Piano/Vocal Concert Features German and Irish Songs

On **Sunday**, **March 11** at **4:00** pm, House of Hope MUSIC AT FOUR will present soprano Patricia Kent and pianist Robert Koopmann in a recital featuring German lieder by Schubert, Berg, Alma Mahler, songs by Twin Cities composer David Evan Thomas and Irish songs, including arrangements by Britten and Stanford. Robert Koopmann will play piano pieces by Claude Debussy. Both artists are members of the music faculty of St. John's University, Collegeville.

This program has developed from the time Patricia Kent spent during the fall of 2006 in Galway, Ireland leading a study group from the College of St. Benedict-St. John's University. In addition, she spent time in Salzburg, Vienna and Munich that provided opportunity to explore the deep connections to German lieder found in American song and to experience the rich folksong tradition of Ireland.

The Crucifixion by John Stainer

The choir of Saint John the Evangelist Episcopal Church will sing the *The Crucifixion* by John Stainer on **Sunday**, **March 18** at **4:00 pm** following the service of Evensong. The cantata will feature tenor Brock Metzger and baritone David Jacobson with organist Robert Vickery. James Frazier, organist and director of music at the church, will conduct.

John Stainer (1840-1901) was born in Southwark and was a boy chorister at Saint Paul's Cathedral in London. At age sixteen he was named organist at Saint Michael's College in Tenbury. He served as organist at Magdalene College, Oxford, before being named to the post at Saint Paul's. His work as a choir trainer and organist set standards for Anglican church music that survive to this day.

The Crucifixion has probably never enjoyed the success that followed its 1887 premiere, when it was given more performances than any choral works save Handel's Messiah, and Mendelssohn's Elijah, St. Paul and Lobgesang, but it remains a fixture of the English choral scene. The chorus "Fling Wide the Gates" is much enjoyed by choirs, and the tender motet "God So Loved the World" is loved by congregations the world over. The cantata includes several hymns for the congregation.

Saint John the Evangelist is located at 60 Kent Street (corner of Portland) in Saint Paul. Off-street parking is available on Summit Avenue at Kent. A free-will offering will be received and a festive reception will follow the service. The church is handicap accessible from Kent. For further information contact Jim Frazier at 651 228-1172 x38. □

2007 marks the 300th anniversary of Dietrich Buxtehude's death. In addition, the birthday of J.S. Bach is celebrated on March 21. In recognition of these milestones, this recital is planned as a birthday/anniversary bash, with cake served during intermission at the First Lutheran event. Also, youth of all ages will be encouraged to sit in the loft at First Lutheran during the first half of the program for a closer view of the workings of the organ. The Singers and Orchestra of The Bach Society of Minnesota will perform a concert of wedding cantatas on **Sunday**, **March 18** at **4:00 pm** at the University Lutheran Church of Hope, 601 13th Avenue SE, Minneapolis. A pre-concert talk by Michael Steinberg will begin at 3:30.

The program, conducted by Bach Society director Thomas Lancaster, includes Bach's early sacred cantata *Der Herr denket an uns*, BWV 196, his secular cantata for solo soprano *Weichet nur, betrübte Schatten*, BWV 202, and two sacred cantatas from the later (Leipzig) period: *Dem Gerechten muß das Licht immer wieder aufgehen*, BWV 195, and *Gott ist unsre Zuversicht*, BWV 197.

Diane Bish DisPLAYS her Talents at Bethel!

Diane Bish, renowned organ virtuoso and host of The Joy of Music television series will play a solo organ recital on the majestic, 67-rank, 3-manual Blackinton Pipe organ in the Benson Great Hall of Bethel University in St. Paul, Minnesota on Friday, March 23, at 7:30 pm. The concert is free.

Diane Bish has displayed her dazzling virtuosity and unique showmanship the world over. Critics have hailed her performances as stunning, virtuoso, fiery, and astonishing. Through numerous recordings, concert and



weekly television appearances, Diane Bish is the most visible organist in the world today. Her Joy of Music television program is available to over 300 million viewers weekly and features Miss Bish playing famous organs in solo and with other classical musicians in cathedrals, churches and concert halls from around the world.

"Her playing is virtuosic and solidly musical...she blasted the crowd out of its pews in a whooping standing ovation" (The Boston Globe). Known for her ability to rouse audiences like no other organist can, Miss Bish's performances have received rave reviews in the United States and abroad. She is an internationally acclaimed musician with many honors including the National Citation from The National Federation of Music Clubs of America (1989). Miss Bish was the first organist to receive this award for "the highest honor for distinguished service to the musical, artistic and cultural life of the nation." She shares this rare distinction with such legends as Leonard Bernstein, Eugene Ormandy, Van Cliburn, Robert Shaw and Irving Berlin.

A consummate church musician, Diane Bish served as senior organist and artist-in-residence at the Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida for over 20 years. While at Coral Ridge Church, she was instrumental in developing one of the country's first church concert series, creating an annual church music workshop for musicians around the world and designing the 117-rank Ruffatti organ, distinguished as one of the great organs in America. In her book *Church Music Explosion*, Miss Bish shares her philosophy of excellence in church music. Miss Bish has recorded on the foremost organs of the world and was the first American woman to record on the four organs of Freiburg Cathedral,

Germany. Featured on over 30 of her recordings are music for organ and orchestra, brass and organ, great organ masterpieces, organ and harp, original works and hymn arrangements. The sparkling creativity and artistry of Diane Bish is equally evident in her compositions. She has composed numerous solo pieces, arrangements and full symphonic works, which have received much acclaim and are performed regularly due to her ability to combine musical quality with accessibility.

Diane Bish began her study with Dorothy Addy in Wichita, Kansas, and continued as a student of Mildred Andrews. She was a recipient of Fulbright and French government grants for study in Amsterdam and Paris with Nadia Boulanger, Gustav Leonhardt and Marie Claire Alain. *Diane Bish: First Lady of the Organ* by Warren Woodruff was published in 1993.

Miss Bish will play a program of exciting and beloved organ favorites and original hymn arrangements to demonstrate the varied colors and sounds capable of the impressive 67-rank, 3-manual Blackinton pipe organ that was installed in 2003 in the Benson Great Hall of Bethel University. Miss Bish has made a name for herself by packing concert halls, churches and cathedrals for her organ recitals that are fun and interesting for audiences of all musical tastes and ages. \square

Organist Lawrence W. Lawyer and internationally-known soprano Maria Jette team up for a concert as part of the Worship & Sacred Music Series at St. Olaf Catholic Church in downtown Minneapolis **Friday**, **March 23** at **7:30 pm** utilizing the church's 2001 67-rank Lively-Fulcher pipe organ.

Pieces to be performed include Pange lingua by Nicolas de Grigny (in alternatim), Berceuse (with French Iullaby) by Louis Vierne, Stabat Mater by Giovanni F. Sances, Adagio for Strings by Samuel Barber, Sortie in B-flat by Joseph Marie Guy-Ropartz, and the premiere performance of Three Psalms composed for Maria Jette by Mr. Lawyer.

Lawrence W. Lawyer is Associate Organist/Pianist at St. Olaf Catholic Church in downtown Minneapolis, and staff organist at the Cathedral of St. Paul. A church musician since the age of 11, he has held full-time posts at a number of prominent parishes in the Upper Midwest including the Cathedral of St. Joseph the Workman in La Crosse, and the Church of Saint Louis, King of France in St. Paul where he founded the concert series *Musique de Saint-Louis*.

Through the years, he has served as teacher, conductor, clinician and adjudicator in such areas as organ, choral technique, service playing and church music program development, and has composed music for worship and for solo organ. In 1987 his *Marian Suite* was premiered at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C., and his *Fantasy on Rorate Cæli* at Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago.

He has performed organ recitals across the United States, primarily in cathedral churches, has served as organist for numerous diocesan and pontifical liturgies in three dioceses, and has served on commissions for worship and music. He is a member of the Conference of Roman Catholic Cathedral Musicians.

A graduate of Millikin University in church music, he studied with Wilma Jensen and Janette Fishell at Scarritt Graduate School in Nashville while earning the Master of Sacred Music degree. He has coached with several colleagues.

Maria Jette has appeared with The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, Houston, Kansas City, Santa Rosa, Charlotte, Buffalo, Grand Rapids, Austin and San Antonio Symphonies, New York Chamber Symphony and the Portland Baroque Orchestra, and for many merry seasons with *Ex Machina Antique Music Theatre* in the Twin Cities. With conductor Helmuth Rilling, she's sung Bach, Mozart and Haydn around the

US, Germany, Spain, Venezuela, Japan and Canada. In her alternate persona, she's performed her own production of Seuss/Kapilow's *Green Eggs & Ham* for over 30,000 children around the USA. A regular guest at the Oregon Bach and San Luis Obispo Mozart Festivals and the Oregon Festival of American Music, she's often heard locally with *Vocalessence*, Chamber Music Society of Minnesota and Minnesota Sinfonia, and in the annual *Sopranorama!* at the Southern Theater (with Dan Chouinard); as well as nationally on *A Prairie Home Companion*.

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St. John the Evangelist signs contract with the Schantz Organ Company

The Episcopal parish of Saint John the Evangelist, on Kent Street in Saint Paul, has signed a contract with the Schantz Organ Company (Paul Lohman, representative) for the implementation of Phase II of its project to restore, refurbish and enlarge its 1922 E.M. Skinner, Opus 371. Phase I entailed the design, construction and installation of a new Schantz console in the style of Skinner, replacing the one built by the Moller Organ Company in 1950, which had become increasingly unreliable after fifty-five years of use. The new console was installed in November 2005.

Besides cleaning, repairing and restoring all the pipework, the overall purpose of Phase II is to reverse the tonal changes made to the organ by Moller in 1950, so that the Skinner instrument, still largely intact, will more faithfully represent the instrument as originally constructed in 1922. To that end, the ranks that were moved to new locations in 1950 will be returned to their original chests, including, for instance, the choir diapason 8 (currently playing at 4' pitch in the swell). Several original ranks that were revoiced by Moller will be returned to their original timbre, including the swell Cornopean (currently sounding as a Trumpet). New ranks added to the organ by Moller, including the great Fifteenth and Mixture, will be replaced by new ranks more in keeping with the Skinner esthetic. The Moller Trombone 16' in the pedal, with metal resonators, will be replaced by a Trombone with wooden resonators, like the Skinner rank it replaced, and the Moller Bombarde, in the solo, that replaced the Skinner Tuba, will be replaced by a new Tuba more in the style of Skinner. Moller moved the original swell mixture (with a tierce rank) to the choir, isolating the individual ranks so they could be played separately at 2 2/3', 2', and 1 3/5' pitches. Schantz will replace these principal ranks with flute ranks at the same pitches, and the current swell mixture (by Moller) will be replaced by a new five-rank mixture. In addition, Schantz will expand the instrument by adding a number of brand new ranks in keeping with the

practices of Skinner, including, in the great division, a Tromba, a Twelfth, a Second Open Diapason and a Double Diapason (extension of the Second Open). A Flauto Mirabilis will be added to the solo division. Two of the more remarkable ranks by Skinner will remain intact, namely, the Vox Humana in the swell, and the French Horn in the solo. Phase II of the project will begin in November 2007.

The third and last phase of the project will entail the design and construction of an antiphonal division—a principal chorus and a unit gedeckt rank at 16', 8' and 4'—to be placed on the balcony rail. \Box
