Illuminating Bolcom

Audiences will have the opportunity to get to know this modern American genius whose down-to-earth good nature belies his accomplishments as one of our most respected living composers. This April and May, VocalEssence and a host of partner arts organizations in the Twin Cities will turn the spotlight on Bolcom with a festival of his music titled *Illuminating Bolcom*.

"We'll explore the vast range of his cabaret, opera, art song, organ, chamber, choral and



orches- William Bolcom and Philip Brunelle tral music in venues ranging all the way from Orchestra Hall to the rotunda in the new wing of the Minneapolis Institute of Arts," says Philip Brunelle, adding, "We are connecting the forces of many of Minnesota's leading arts and educational institutions to make this festival a reality."

The centerpiece of the festival is an ambitious staging of Bolcom's Songs of Innocence and of Experience, a setting of William Blake's poetry that won four 2005 Grammys. More than 400 musicians will take the stage at Orchestra Hall in a thrilling production involving projected images, a multi-tiered set and live video. Tickets are already on sale for two performances (April 28 and 29); call 612-371-5656 (800-292-4141) to order.

Of particular interest to TCAGO members and **organ lovers** in general, **David Higgs** (Eastman School of Music Organ Professor) will devote an entire festival program to selections from the four books of **William Bolcom's jazz-inspired "Gospel Preludes"**. Based on familiar songs from the late 19th and early 20th century revival traditions, these pieces explore the 'spiritual essence' of the old songs while transforming them in remarkable ways that exploit the pipe organ's color resources and challenge the player's virtuosity.

The Higgs concert takes place on **Sunday, April 22 at 4:00 pm** at Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church (511

Tribute to Paul Emch

It is a daunting task to write a tribute to such a colleague as Paul Emch because there are so many facets to his personality and accomplishments, all worthy of lengthy description. Let me begin by telling about the beginnings of his interest in music. Paul grew up in Aitkin, Minnesota. In his home there was a large upright piano and a parlor organ, the latter being his choice at age four for beginning to improvise, which later

became a skill for which he became greatly admired throughout his career as a church musician. His formal study began with a series of teachers throughout high

school. He took full advantage of the opportunity to practice improvising on hymns, since there was not much printed music available. He determined to become the best liturgical organist possible and pursued his dream at the U (B.A. in 1957) under the tutelage of Arthur Jennings. He later played a senior recital under Paul Manz. During these student years, job opportunities took him to the University Lutheran

Chapel, still self-taught, using an old STAINER METHOD book and some Lorenz publications. Challenges came when he was selected to take over for Paul Manz at Mount Olive for a year, and in 1958 he was hired at a neighborhood Methodist church, and later to Saint Mark's Episcopal as assistant to Gerald Bales (1964-66). Then, back to the Lutheran fold, he served for 13 years at Salem English Lutheran, " a church with leadership way ahead of its time ", says Paul. Breaking his wrist kept him out for a year until he joined the staff at Nativity Lutheran Church in St. Anthony, where he stayed 15 years. His expertise was proven there, when, on one occasion, the orchestra, planning to accompany a major choral work, could not meet the challenge, so Paul learned the whole orchestral reduction and played it on the piano. In 1955 he was selected to serve at Cross View Lutheran Church (LCMS) in Edina, the church of his confirmation. He continued there until recently.

Of the many colleagues' comments, Paul's positive support is always noted.

"Paul is one of the best church organists I've ever heard."

"He sparked the hymn singing with his creative improvisations, providing a fresh approach to tunes and texts. He inspires the congregation to join in song, has a great sense of humor, loves a great joke, greatly supports those in the community around him, attends a myriad of concerts, recitals and services to support, as well as to be blessed himself."

"He loves to improvise, with a twinkle in his eye, and a sense of humor."

"He encouraged people, especially young people, and supported colleagues by attending myriad events, and often followed up by sending supportive messages of encouragement."


"A servant of the church, he has a real sense of good church music, acquired over many years. He spoke no unkind words, was impeccably groomed. He played a great deal without scores: the music was in his head."


"Paul has been a cheerleader for the organ community and is in attendance at most concerts in the area....even in this current trial."

This week Paul told me, " I have fulfilled my dream of being a servant of the church for over 55 years. I was recently diagnosed with lung cancer, which has put a stop to my playing. I came to full acceptance of the finality of the disease, playing for the last time the end of December. I give thanks to almighty God daily for those many years I have had and am now finding other avenues to be of service to spread the ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ. "

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Minnetonka Choral Society Presents The Creation and the Passion

The Minnetonka Choral Society will be joined by the Westminster Presbyterian Choir in performing a concert entitled The Creation and the Passion. The featured works are In the Beginning by Aaron Copland and Stabat Mater by Antonin Dvorak. Maestro Jere Lantz, who is music director for both groups, will conduct.

The first performance will be on Friday, March 30, at 7:30 pm in the Hopkins High School Auditorium, 2400 Lindbergh Drive, Minnetonka, (north of Cedar Lake Road and east of Hopkins Crossroad). A second performance will take place Sunday, April 1, at 3:00 pm at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Nicollet Mall at 12th Street in Minneapolis.

Tickets are \$15 for adults and \$10 for students under 17. They can be purchased from Ticket Works (no fees!) at www.ticketworks.com or 651-209-6689, from chorus members or at the door.

For composers better known in the orchestral world, Copland and Dvorak offer surprisingly powerful choral music perfect for this season of the year. Copland's In the Beginning presents the opening words of Genesis-the story of creation-in his most incisive style. This declamatory a cappella piece is

balanced on the program by the lush depth of Dvorak's Stabat Mater, a meditation on Christ's Passion for chorus, soloists and orchestra.

Although Dvorak's music-especially his New World symphony-is cherished by music lovers everywhere, his early choral masterpiece Stabat Mater remains rarely heard. Yet its sympathetic portrait of Mary beholding the crucifixion of her Son presents some of the most beautiful and moving music the Czech master ever brought to life. Dvorak is not usually thought of as a choral or a dramatic composer. But in this work he is both, with vocal lines that soar, climaxes that explode and endings that fade into eternity. \Box

Music at Twilight Concerts Feature Organist Gerrit Lamain

On **April 1, 2007**, (Palm Sunday) at **7:30 pm** at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church , 1575 Charlton, West St. Paul, as part of the 'Music at Twilight' concert series, Gerrit W. Lamain, St. Stephen's Organist/Music Director, will present a free concert. A free will offering will be received for the Neighbors Food Shelf. The program, THE VIA DOLOROSA (the Way of Suffering), is a retelling of the crucifixion story using the spoken word and music. The presentation will be played on the church's four-manual, Netherlands built, Johannus Digital Organ, augmented with 12 ranks of pipes.

When asked to describe the program, Gerrit said, "When I began to play organ concerts, I created the 'Via Dolorosa' program. The audience still hears the familiar story, but it is told in such a way that the audience has time to meditate on each segment of the story. The libretto has been gathered from the various Gospel accounts. The words come from the King James Bible translation, known for its poetic beauty . The texts have been prerecorded and are played over the church's sound system. This was done to create continuity, and it also eliminates the need for a reader. Thus there are no distractions."

Gerrit suggests to the audience that they think of the program as though it is a radio drama, allowing the imagination to roam, and thus becoming one with the story. It literally puts the audience at the crucifixion. An audience member commented that it was the most powerful Lenten presentation she had ever experienced. She said, "I felt as if I were standing at the foot of the cross, alone."

On **April 29, 2007**, at **4:00 pm** at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, as part of the church's 'Music at Twilight' concert series, Gerrit W. Lamain will present a free concert. The program, TREASURES FROM THE GENEVA PSALTER, will present music by a variety of Dutch composers using Geneva Psalter tunes. The audience will be given the opportunity to sing some of these musical treasures (in English). Dutch music, on a Dutch organ played by a native Dutchman! A DUTCH TREAT indeed! A free will offering will be received for the Neighbors Food Shelf.

Gerrit, a Dutch Reformed minister's son, grew up in The Netherlands singing these psalm tunes from his early youth. In this program he will recreate the Dutch, Calvinistic service, utilizing arrangements in the Romantic tradition by such famous Dutch organ composers as Jan Zwart, Feike Asma, Jac Bonset and others.



Lawrence Archbold Continues Rectial Series

An organ recital, "Organ Music of the Seventeenth and Eighteenth Centuries: From *Stylus Fantasticus* to *Style Galant*: Program II," will be performed by Lawrence Archbold on the Holtkamp organ in the Concert Hall of Carleton College, Northfield, on **Sunday**, **April 22**, **2007**, at **3:00 pm**. It is the seventeenth in his series of recitals, "Exploring Organ Music." Marking the 300th anniversary of the death of Dieterich Buxtehude, the first half of the program features music of that composer. Celebrating the 300th anniversary of the birth of Michel Corrette, the second half includes rarely heard music of the mid eighteenth century by Corrette, Balbastre, and Martini. The concert closes with the familiar Fantasia in G Minor of J. S. Bach.

Lawrence Archbold is Professor of Music and Enid and Henry Woodward College Organist at Carleton College. The concert is open to the public and admission is free. Call (507) 646-4347 for further information.

St. Mark's Music Series Presents Friedell Organ Symphony

Raymond Johnston, organist and Canon Musician of St. Mark's Episcopal Cathedral, will perform organ works by Harold Friedell, Pierre Cochereau, and Dietrich Buxtehude in recital on **Sunday**, **April 15**, **4:00 pm** at the Cathedral, 519 Oak Grove Street, Minneapolis. Admission is free of charge.

The centerpiece of the concert is the three-movement **Symphony in E minor** by Harold Friedell, written in 1935 and premiered by William Strickland in 1936. The work was never published, and the composer's early death at age 52 prevented him from revisiting the piece.

Johnston says, "Organists will be already familiar with the expressive *Cantabile* movement of the **Symphony in E minor**, which has been published separately, but the outer movements have such a compelling sense of power and drive to them that the resulting three-movement work is in turn majestic, wistful and exuberant."

"We're pleased to have been given special access to the composer's original manuscripts," Johnston adds. "We look forward to providing this rare opportunity for the Twin Cities music community to hear this fine example of American organ music."

Organ Symphony in E minor of Harold Friedell By Dave Fielding

Known primarily for his famous choral anthem "Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether," Harold Friedell was one of the most influential church musicians of his day. After serving in positions at New York's Calvary Episcopal Church and St. John's Episcopal Church in Jersey City, New Jersey, in 1946 Friedell ascended to what was arguably the most coveted position of his trade when he replaced David Mc K. Williams as Organist and Choirmaster of St. Bartholomew's Church. Sadly, his career was cut short on Sunday morning, February 17, 1958, when at the age of only 52 he suffered a fatal heart attack while en route to St. Bartholomew's.

Friedell studied organ and improvisation with Clement Gale and David Mc K. Williams, and composition with Bernard Wagenaar and Roger Sessions. He also served on the faculty of the Juilliard School of Music and the Guilmant Organ School. For many years following the Second World War, he taught composition at the Union Theological Seminary School of Sacred Music. Friedell's compositions for organ were few in number, possibly reflecting his skills and preference for improvisation. Of his seven works for solo organ, only the Verses for the Nunc Dimittis, Cantabile (2nd Movement from the Symphony in E minor), Prelude on St. Columba, and Intermezzo have been published.

Curiously, his magnum opus, the Symphony in E minor, which was composed in 1935 while Friedell was serving at St. John's Episcopal in Jersey City, has never been published. It received only one performance in 1936 by William Strickland, Friedell's close friend, to whom the Symphony is dedicated.

In 2002, David Friedell, Harold's son was kind enough to provide copies of the Symphony manuscripts for study. There are two versions of the Symphony: The first manuscript, which appears to be a "work in progress," consists of four movements, modeled after the French symphonic form – Allegro, Cantabile, Scherzo, and Toccata. The second manuscript is thought to be the version used by William Strickland in the premiere performance. This version consists of only three movements, deleting the Scherzo and including in the Toccata an inner Chorale.

Research into the performance history of the work took place during the summer of 2006 with the few remaining contemporary associates of Friedell. Interviews with Fred Swann, Gerre Hancock and Allen Sever, each serving as Assistant to Friedell at St. Bartholomew's, were unaware that the work even existed. David Friedell has no personal recollection, as the piece was composed and performed six years before he was born, but has indicated that he believes his father intended to revisit the original four-movement version of the work but was unable to do so before his death.

After careful study of the two manuscripts and in close consultation with David Friedell, organist Raymond Johnston has chosen to perform the three-movement version with the expanded Toccata movement that was used in the premiere performance. The recital will take place on Sunday, April 15, at 4 p.m. at St. Mark's Cathedral in Minneapolis, where Johnston is Canon Musician. Admission is free of charge.

Thierry Escaich Performs at St. Thomas

Thierry Escaich, organist of St-Etienne-du-Mont in Paris and Professor of Music at the Paris Conservatoire will present an organ recital on the Gabriel Kney organ in the St. Thomas Aguinas Chapel at the University of St. Thomas on Tuesday, April 17 at 8:15 pm.

Renowned organist and improviser, Thierry Escaich continues to play a prominent role in the creation of contemporary music. Since 1990, when he ended his studies at the Paris Conservatoire having received eight first prizes, his first works have been rewarded with the Franco-American Florence Blumenthal Foundation prize, awarded unanimously by a jury made up of such figures as Elliott Carter, Henri Dutilleux and Maurice Ohana. More prizes have followed awarded by the French Institute and SACEM (including the Grand Prix de la musique symphonique in 2004) after he was awarded the Grand Prix des Lycéens in 2002 en route to receiving the 2003 Victoires de la Musique Composer of the Year award.

His musical universe has been described as one "of rare expressive density" (Télérama), "in which are combined breathless or impassioned elans and rhythmic motors that are often violent and obstinate, readily drawing from the sources of Gregorian plainchant" (Le Monde). This universe. "made up of dramatic frothing strained to exhaustion and the often-brutal confrontation of opposing sound worlds" (Grégoire Hetzel), is embodied in such works as Le Chant des Ténèbres (1992) and his Organ Con- Thierry Escaich certo (1995) as well as Résur-



gences for trumpet and orchestra (2002) and his oratorio Le Dernier Evangile (2000).

His orchestral works feature in the repertoires of various leading European orchestras such as the Orchestra of the Beethovenhalle (Bonn), the Monte-Carlo Philharmonic, l'Orchestre Philharmonique de Radio-France (Paris) and l'Orchestre National de Lille where Thierry Escaich was in residence between 2003 and 2005. His vocal and chamber music is performed all over the globe by such ensembles as the BBC Singers. A Sei Voci, the Ludwig Ouartet, Olivier Latry and the Wanderer Trio. His CD of orchestral works (Accord/Universal) was awarded the Diapason d'Or de l'année in 2002.

Organist at St-Etienne-du-Mont in Paris since 1997 (where he succeeded Maurice Duruflé), Thierry Escaich leads a parallel career as an international organist which has led to him becoming an ambassador of the great French organ school of improvisation. This is attested by his diverse recordings under the Chamade and Calliope labels which have been awarded numerous musical distinctions such as the Grand Prix de la Nouvelle Académie du Disgue (1996) and the "Choc du Monde de la musique" (1998) for his interpretations of works by Brahms. The "incandescent breath and inexhaustible energy" (Diapason) of his improvisations make him a worthy successor to the grand masters such as G. Franck and Cochereau. Lastly, his passion for the cinema has motivated him to improvise on the piano and the organ, and to compose for silent film as demonstrated in his musical accompaniment of Frank Borzage's L'Heure suprême, commissioned by the Louvre in 1999. Thierry Escaich has been professor of composition and improvisation at the Paris Conservatoire since 1992.

Memories of Joyce Hilary

Last September, Joyce Hilary passed away, and I wish to make a few comments for those who remember Joyce, and those who did not know her.

Joyce was born in Braham, Minnesota and graduated from high school in Cambridge, Minnesota. Charles Hendrickson told me that Joyce's Swedish father could not pronounce "J" as we do, so he called her Yoyce! She grew up near Charles' mother's home in Isanti county, known as "little Dalarna" county. She is survived by a brother (John Westrom) and two sisters (Betty Skold and Jean Miller) as well as nieces and nephews. Joyce graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College where she met her husband, Frederic Hilary, who was on the faculty there.



For 47 years Joyce served as a church organist – 25 years at Central Lutheran, 6 years at Grace Lutheran in Apple Valley, and 16 years at Peace Presbyterian in St. Louis

Park. And for 38 years she was accompanist and partner with her husband, Frederic, in the Minneapolis Madrigal Singers – later to be named the Frederic Hilary Chorale. During her time at Central Lutheran the Central Choir made two international radio broadcasts, and the Madrigal Singers performed in the first Minnesota Opera production at the Guthrie Theater, Dominick Argento's *The Masque of Angels*.

Dominick Argento writes of Joyce: "I cannot speak of Joyce alone because I rarely thought of Joyce and Fred separately. I don't believe I ever saw Fred without Joyce...their devotion to one another is the most striking quality that comes to my mind whenever I recall them. And in that sense, I guess you might say, they are finally together once more."

Personally, my first meeting with Joyce was as her 4-hand partner in Brahms' *Liesbeslieder Waltzes* with the Hilary Chorale. I was still in high school and had been recommended by my choir director, Harry Opel (at Minnehaha Academy) to perform with Joyce. On that occasion, as she was throughout her life, she was lively, flamboyant, kind and totally devoted to the music. She was a significant and beloved presence on the choral music scene in our community.



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Those Gospel Preludes...composer William Bolcom provides glimpses into the creation of these beguiling re-imaginings of familiar American tunes.

Between 1979 and 1984, Bolcom composed four books of *Gospel Preludes*, three pieces per book, many of which stretch a player's capacity to virtuosic extremes. They draw upon themes from still-familiar turn-of-the-century hymns, such as *What a Friend We Have in Jesus, Amazing Grace*, and *Shall We Gather At the River*. Bolcom's inspiration also came from African-American gospel-music, woven with his own unique and ecclectic imagination.

Our survey embraces nine works (Books 1, 2 and 4
