Greetings to the Chapter,

AGO '08 draws ever near! As of April 7, there were 177 members of the TCAGO registered for the convention. Hurrah to all of you who were able to take advantage of the early registration rates! Emails continue to come to me from people locally who are rejoining AGO

in order to register for the convention. That is good news, indeed. The registrar is receiving 10-12 registrations per week and reports the convention total now at 1,390. Historically, there tends to be another surge of registrants 4 to 6 weeks prior to the convention. We hope you will be among them. We want and need to reach 1,900+.

Regular TCAGO members can still register for \$430, seniors for \$390, and students for \$300. Daily registrations are an option at \$200/day including transportation. That will be the least you will ever pay again to attend a national convention. Think of the concerts, the workshops, the commissioned works, the worship services, the colleagues, AND the bins. We "hurdled" over the difficulty of an improvised table, made a "grand stand" play by dragging a couple of benches across the grass and were altogether satisfied after we had had a good chance at the eats.

After dinner we went up to the beautiful chapel and enjoyed some numbers on the splendid new Steere organ by our Dean, Mr. Thornton and our host, Mr. Wood. We also were interested in the music building with its attractive studies and complete furnishings.

We returned to Minneapolis on the four o'clock Dan Patch train, everyone declaring the picnic a perfect success, affording us an opportunity to become better acquainted with each other and with the many musical advantages offered by our beautiful Minnesota.



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PREMIERE OF CONCERTO FOR ORGAN AND ORCHESTRA

As Music director of the Civic Orchestra of Minneapolis, I have collaborated on several performances with Diana Lee Lucker on the C. Charles Jackson pipe organ at Wayzata Community Church. So it seemed natural for Diana Lee to ask me to write a piece for her and the organ and the Civic Orchestra. At our first meeting about the project she encouraged me to "think outside the box" about this piece. On one hand, that opened up a lot of possibilities and on the other, it gave me quite a challenge. I needed to leave the safe realm of the standard three-movement concerto and its formulaic fast-slow-fast structure.

I usually spend a great deal of time thinking about a piece and reading before I put any notes to the page. I came across a little book by James Thurber, *The Last Flower*. Originally published in November 1939, two months after World War II officially began, Thurber's parable in pictures – a graphic novel ahead of its day - is about the eternal cycles of war, peace and love. It expresses a simple deep truth; the unending cycle of birth, death and rebirth.

The story is told with a few well-chosen words combined with several line drawings. Civilization has collapsed after World War II, dogs have deserted their masters, all the groves and gardens have been destroyed, and love has vanished from the earth. Then one day. "a young girl who has never seen a

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flower chanced to come upon the last one in the world." I was enthralled with this little book and its message and decided to use it as the structure for my piece, *The Last Flower: Fantasy for Organ and Orchestra.* The work is in a single movement that follows the narrative structure of the book. With permission from the publisher, we plan on projecting images from the book as the piece is being played.

Cary John Franklin

My music making with Cary John Franklin has always been a joy and so I could think of no composer better equipped to compose a "new" concerto for organ and orchestra. My intent, with this newly-commissioned work, was to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the installation of the Charles Hendrickson 71-rank tracker organ in the new sanctuary of Wayzata Community Church. The purchase of this instrument was made possible by a large contribution to the project by the late C. Charles Jackson after whom the instrument is named. I will be the organ soloist and, together with the Civic Orchestra of Minneapolis, a multi-media presentation, and Cary John Franklin directing, we hope to bring James Thurber to life!

The concert happening is **Sunday**, **May 11**, at **3:00 pm** at Wayzata Community Church, 125 E. Wayzata Blvd. Wayzata, Minnesota. The concert is free and open to all.

Bethel Presents Carlo Curley in Concert

Carlo Curley will present a full concert on the Blackinton organ on **Friday**, **May 16**, **2008** in the Benson Great Hall on the campus of Bethel University at **7:30 pm**.

He is one of the few artists in the world who gives concerts on the classical organ, unsupported by a teaching or church position. His mission is to establish the organ at the forefront of musical instruments, "even if it takes the rest of my life." He has performed in many of the major international venues, in both orchestral and solo contexts, including recently in Japan, Hong Kong, Australia and France, where he was one of only five world-class recitalists invited to perform on the magnificent new instrument in the Church of St. Eustache, Paris, during the inaugural year series. He has also given recitals on many other great organs of Europe.

His many and extensive North American tours now include most of the major venues both in Canada and the USA, including New York's Carnegie Hall. By special invitation of the President, Carlo made history by playing the first ever classical organ concert at the White House. In North America his television and radio contributions range from the chat shows (Studs Terkel, etc.) to a major concert, broadcast live across the continent from the Roy Thompson Hall in Toronto, where he has performed several times. He has also made a

television documentary for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Born in North Carolina in 1952 into a musical family, Carlo's first training was taken in hand at the age of four by his grandmother, a widely respected piano teacher. Subsequent teachers include the American Virgil Fox, Robert Elmore, Arthur Poister and Britain's foremost organist Sir George Thalben-Ball.

He has over 2 dozen recordings including titles made for the RCA 'Red-Seal' and ProArte labels. He is particularly proud of the CD 'The Finest Hour,' featuring the superb 'Father' Willis organ at Blenheim Palace, England, made at the request of the Duke of Marlborough after Carlo had played the Winston Churchill Memorial Concert there.

His world-wide press reviews are unstinting in their praise. Not only has he been dubbed 'the Pavarotti of the Organ' he is also said to have "inherited the mantle of the late Virgil Fox" - high praise indeed for any performing musician. The concert is free and open to the public.

Collaborating with Mr. Hohman is St. Michael's "house band," no other than the 75 members of the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra, conducted by its Music Director **Joseph Schlefke**.


