Music of Jehan Alain Festival

St. John's University/College of St. Benedict, and the American Guild of Organists, Twin Cities Chaper, are cosponsoring a "Music of Jehan Alain Festival" at the Basilica of St. Mary, Friday and Saturday, May 22/23, 2009. Alain, one of France's most brilliant and promising young composers, died in WW II at 29 years of age. His music is wonderfully original and colorful, and his compositions remain among the most frequently performed in the organ repertoire to this day. In partial celebration of the magnificent newly-restored Basilica organ, organists, vocalists and instrumentalists will perform a concert Friday evening at 8:00 pm in the Basilica. Performers will be drawn from the immediate Twin Cities area and from across the state. Among the featured soloists will be KR Kasling, Professor at St. John's and Senior Adjunct Basilica Organist; Chris Stroh, Principal Basilica Organist; Kraig Windschitl, Organist at Mount Olivet Lutheran; Jackie Holstrom, Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Duluth; and Steve Gentile, Dean of the Twin Cities Chapter, American Guild of Organists. Other musicians known to area organ aficionados, including Rachel Hest, flutist, will also perform on the program. Admission is free and open; an offering will be received to help defray expenses.

On **Saturday** morning, beginning at **10:00 am**, Dr. Norma Stevlingson, Professor from the University of Wisconsin,



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2009-2010 TCAGO Program Season Announced

Your TCAGO Program Committee has been working faithfully to plan a wonderful year of organ-related events in 2009-2010. As you think about your musical calendar for the coming year, be sure to save time to join in these Guild activities.

We kick off our program year on **Sunday**, **September 27**, for the season opening event and installation of officers. First, we'll attend the opening concert in the "Widor Marathon" series – the first of five events in which the entire cycle of the organ symphonies of Charles-Marie Widor will be performed by ten local organists. The opening concert will be at

2:00 pm at Church of the Nativity of our Lord in St. Paul. Following that, we'll have a time for greeting friends and will hold the installation of officers. A festive dinner will conclude the event.

On **Saturday**, **October 3**, the beautiful college town of Northfield, Minnesota will be our destination for an Organ Crawl. We will start at Carleton College, then proceed to St. Olaf College, with lunch at St. Olaf. Later in the day we will visit the organs at local churches. Michael Barone is leading the Organ Crawl and will be on hand to guide and share his expert knowledge.

Two seminar/workshop events in the fall and winter will look at topics of current interest to all of us. Aaron David Miller will be our presenter for a session on "Internet Resources for Organists." Aaron will discuss and demonstrate how to use the rich resource of the Internet to find downloadable organ, choral and instrumental scores, how to find professional musicians in an area, how to find choral lyrics to print in bulletins, and more. Then, John Ferguson will lead a special session on "The Changing Role of the Church Organist". Are you being asked to do more contemporary music, use piano or keyboard rather than organ, play different roles in your church or adopt different practices as a result of cost pressures? Come and hear John's take on these questions.

Hold the date of **February 13** for "Midwinter Music", a day of workshops and training sessions for organists and choral musicians of all experience levels.

Then, in the spring, look forward to hearing and meeting talented young organists at "Future Organists of America." Local competition winners will play for us, then Michael Barone will facilitate a panel discussion with these young people focusing on their plans, aspirations, and how they look to AGO to support and educate them in their careers. We also crawl again – this time, to historic organs around the Twin Cities area. In conjunction with the Organ Historical Society, we'll travel to see and hear a selection of vintage instruments with unique and fascinating histories.

In May, we will present a session on "Music for Smaller Choirs." If you lead, accompany, or help plan the music for a small choir, you will want to be part of this session.

And, as always, we will celebrate the completion of our season in early June with a gala Closing Event.

"Season Closers"

On June 8, we're celebrating the conclusion of our 2008—2009 season with a cruise on Lake Minnetonka. Our 1960 season also ended with a view of the lake. The June issue of *Pipenotes* mentions a June 19th picnic at the home of Sylvestor Cargill, Cottagewood Point, Lake Minnetonka. "Mr. Cargill has a large Wurlitzer pipe organ in his home."

The "Archive News" for May 2008 told about the Minnesota AGO June 17, 1918 picnic in Northfield. You may remember the details about the food, the fire for grilling and the improvised table. There was an AGO picnic on June 15, 1914 too; but the minutes leave out details except to say that it took place at a farm house on the Minnesota River.

The June 19, 1938 minutes are more descriptive. We were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Paul G. Bremer at their summer

home in Forest Lake. Here's how the secretary pro tem, Agnes Wunderlich, described the afternoon's entertainment for the 43 guests:

> "...The guests participated in composing a suitable chime theme as the signature for the WTCN Church Music Appreciation Hour...The themes submitted by George Fairclough and Stanley Avery were awarded prizes presented by our gracious hostess.

> After a delicious picnic supper, the evening was devoted to singing by the group, and impromptu solos and duets on the organ and piano by George Fairclough, Arthur Poister, Francis Richter and Stanley Avery. An interesting feature was an improvisation on one of the chosen chime themes by Dr. Richter."

We're looking forward to the June 8 boat cruise on Lake Minnetonka.

If you haven't already noticed, take a look at our website www.tcago.org and click on Archives. With thanks to our Webmaster David Engen, besides past issues of *Pipenotes*, you can now view our inventory of the TCAGO collections at Westminster Presbyterian Church. St. Mark's Music Series to present

Vaughan Williams "Vexilla Regis" World Premiere
May 30, 2009
St. Mark's Eniscopal Cathodral, 510 Oak Cross S

St. Mark's Episcopal Cathedral, 519 Oak Grove St., Minneapolis, 7:30 pm

With the year 2008 marking the 50th anniversary of the death of Ralph Vaughan Williams, the St. Mark's Music Series sought to feature choral works by the composer, with particular emphasis on those works that are not regularly performed. In reviewing Michael Kennedy's biography of the composer, The Works of Ralph Vaughan Williams, one work, Vexilla Regis, stood apart. Here was a composition by Vaughan Williams that was unknown to us and, given the

theme and scale of the work, it looked to be a perfect selection for our program.

Composed in 1894 in fulfillment of the requirements for his Bachelor of Music degree, *Vexilla Regis* is a four-movement work scored for soprano solo, five-part mixed chorus (SSATB), string orchestra and organ. The work exists only in manuscript form in the Cambridge University Library and has never been performed or published.

In April, 2008, we contacted the Ralph Vaughan Williams Society Chairman at the time, Mr. Stephen Connock, to seek permission to create a performance score from the manuscript and to present the world-premiere of the work as part of our Spring 2009 concert. Mr. Connock introduced us to Mr. Hugh Cobbe, Director of RVW Ltd who graciously granted our request. A digital copy of the manuscript, consisting of 84 pages, was provided by Cambridge University Library in late May 2008 and the score was input into notation software during the summer. The score was then edited and choral, orchestral and organ parts were produced. Rehearsal of the work began in late January 2009.

We asked Dr. Michael Kennedy if he had possible insight into the origins of *Vexilla Regis*. He kindly responded with the following remarks:

"I'm sure Vaughan Williams would be amazed at this interest in his degree exercise. He used to make light of his early works but the fact that he kept them perhaps tells us something. Documentation about this work is almost non-existent. No one knew about it until I published my catalog in 1964. There is no mention of it in his writings and the big volume of his letters edited by Hugh Cobbe and just published has no reference to it. I suspect Vexilla was a chore as far as he was concerned as he seems to have made no attempt to get it performed. Typical! There is an account of his Cambridge days in my The Works of . . ., but the fullest account is in Ursula's RVW. The rest is silence."

With the St. Mark's Music Series' performance on Saturday, May 30th we end that silence, giving voice to a work that serves as a prelude to the six decades of musical genius that were to come.

The concert will also include Vaughan Williams' "Serenade to Music" and Haydn's "Missa in Angustiis" (Nelson Mass).
