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

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
NEW SCHANTZ ORGAN MARTIN LUTHER COLLEGE, NEW ULM, MINNESOTA

The Schantz Organ Company has recently completed the installation of a new pipe organ for Dr. Martin Luther College in New Ulm, Minnesota. Comprised of 3 manuals and 57 ranks, the organ was built in conjunction with the construction of the college's new "Chapel of the Christ." The chapel, the first dedicated chapel in the college's history, has superb acoustics and a seating capacity of 1300.

Plans for this project go back more than 10 years, and it was the organ selection committee's wise goal to have the organ builder work hand-in-hand with architects for the chapel. This proved to create an ideal situation for the organ and for all aspects of music and sound in the space.

The organ is fully encased and speaks down the long-axis of the room. There is choir seating directly in front of the 45' tall case for 100 singers with expansion capability. Tipping a hat to the college's heritage, nomenclature throughout is decidedly German. The façade is comprised of pipes from the 16' Præstant, 16' Principal and 4' Choralbass. The horizontal Trompeta Real features polished copper resonators and speaks on 15" of windpressure.

The first Chapel service was held on March 17, 2010 with a weekend of dedicatory concerts on April 10^{th} and 11^{th} .

Bach Birthday Bash a Sure Success

The weather gods were on our side for the TCAGO's "Before Bach's Birthday" Bash on Saturday, March 20, 2010. A beautiful day outside was made equally beautiful inside by the playing of music by JSB.

Hundreds of people came out to savor our Bach Offerings throughout the day, and thousands of others participated via the live MPR statewide broadcast of the first hour. One couple in Duluth heard that programming and decided to drive to the Twin Cities to partake of the afternoon events! A young family (father, mother, two young daughters) attended all five events. The father told me that he had been listening to PIPEDREAMS since he was a teenager (it did not seem to have warped him in any visible way...). His eldest daughter (perhaps 6 or 7 years old) was VERY interested in everything; she and her dad always sat somewhere with good sight-lines so that she could watch the players at work. Who knows where this will lead....?

Appreciative crowds ranged in size from 125 at St. Olaf RC Church to 320 at Central Lutheran, and quite a few individuals attended most, or all, of the activities. They responded warmly to the variety of repertoire and styles of instruments and playing. The afternoon sequence, with all venues within walking distance, proved to be very popular. The chapel at Westminster Presbyterian was packed full, with overflow on folding chairs plus a dozen people in the vestibule.

Some in the audience were astonishingly (and delightfully) ignorant of the 'ways of the organ'...asking questions about very basic things that organists take for granted: "I never realized that organists play with their feet!"..."What are those buttons for?" (foot controls for the combination action)..."How are the keyboards connected to the pipes?"..."If the console always in that position?" (at St. Olaf, where the console was front-and-center in front of the altar...I suggested that, no, it usually resided over to the side, and would make for a difficult communion if left where it was....). A reminder that there are always 'new friends' for the pipe organ, and it never hurts to explain things.

Thanks to all participants: Raymond Johnston and the St. Mark's Choir; Tami Morse and Paul Boehnke and the Bach Society Chorale at Saint Mark's Cathedral; Dee Ann Crossley and Helen Jensen (fantastic piano-organ duets) at 1st Unitarian Society; Lawrence Lawyer and Michael Ferguson at St. Olaf Catholic; Andrew Hackett, Melanie Ohnstad and Karen Wasiluk at Westminster Presbyterian; and Carolyn Diamond, Roger Ruckert, and Aaron David Miller at Central Lutheran; plus all of the venues for donating their spaces.

In the year 2011, Bach's Birthday falls on a Monday. Whether we should try for a "Before Before Bach's Birthday Bash" on Saturday the 19th remains up in the air (that's Max Reger's Birthday, which does offer some obvious tie-ins, including the possibility of his B-A-C-H Fantasy in the final hour....). Commissioned at a cost of \$60,000 for the Boston Music Hall, the German-built 1863 E. F. Walcker organ, with impressive American-made black-walnut case and burnished tin 32-foot façade pipes, was the first 'concert organ' in the United States, one of the most visually compelling organ designs of all time. However, after only twenty-one years, the Walcker was removed and eventually sold to wealthy businessman Edward F. Searles (1841-1920) for the bargain price of \$1,500. Searles hired Henry Vaughan, architect of the National Cathedral, to design a new space for the mammoth instrument, and the resulting Serlo Organ Hall provided the organ with a unique setting, both acoustically and visually stunning.

The Walcker was used only for private entertainments, and after Serarles' death entered another period of uncertainty until building and instrument were purchased in 1946 by a community organization, the Methuen Memorial Music Hall, Inc. G. Donald Harrison and the Aeolian-Skinner Organ Company reconstructed the instrument, which since has been used for an annual series of summer concerts on Wednesday evenings from late May through early September. The hall also is available for weddings and other social and musical applications, and has earned fame as a recording venue,
