Dean's Column

The following is a year-end review of the 2010 – 2011 season of the TCAGO.

This was a year of celebration – our 100th birthday. St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church in St. Paul was our birthplace. We began the year by holding our first Board meeting and opening event there. We commissioned Michael Dennis Browne for a



new text for the 'Old 100th' that was sung at the opening event. An Oral History Project was completed, excerpts were printed in the opening event booklet and are posted on the web site. In addition, each of the committee members of the OHP wrote an article for *Pipenotes* about their experience. Archivist Jerry Bonstrom also contributed historical articles for *Pipenotes*.

The Hospitality Committee led by Priscilla Franken and the Program Committee led by Karen Flynn were especially active this year. Increased hospitality was a goal of the National AGO. Our Hospitality Committee took a broad view and executed their plans with commitment and energy, to produce a remarkable welcoming atmosphere.

The Program Committee produced the following events: *The Opening event celebrating the 100th year of our founding.

*Piping Hot, recitals sponsored by various Twin Cities churches by world-renowned guest artists accompanied by a series of master classes, which were sponsored by TCAGO. *TCAGO Member Recital

*Theater Organ event at the Fitzgerald Theater sponsored by *Pipedreams* and in cooperation with the Land-o-Lakes Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society.

*A workshop on repertoire for smaller choirs and smaller organs

*The 'Before Bach Birthday Bash' of five concerts in five churches along St. Paul's Summit Ave.

*The Closing Event with organ and orchestra featuring music by Minnesota Composers.

In addition, Mary Newton organized the Student Competition and the Education Committee led by Phil Asgian organized the Pipe Organ Discovery Day. They also worked with teachers and students in Apple Valley; the program in Mounds View culminated in 300 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders being bussed to Westminster Presbyterian Church for organ demonstrations and other related events.

At each of the churches at the 'Before Bach Birthday Bash,' an event organized by Michael Barone, was a box for dona-

tions to the Habitat for Humanity. Over \$1,000 was collected. While there were inquiries about Guild Exams, ultimately no exams were requested or given.

Our fundraising effort "\$100 for 100 Years" was a success. (As of this writing the amount is still being tallied.) We thank the donors for their generosity.

Once a month Board meetings were held in various locations: St. John the Evangelist in St. Paul; David Geslin's office; St. Matthew's Lutheran-ELCA, St. Paul; St. Paul's UCC, St. Paul; Christ the King, Bloomington. I would like to thank those churches and office, and their gracious hosts, James Frazier, David Geslin, Jane Hanson, Geoff Olson and John Salveson for allowing us to use their facilities.

A number of new committees were created. The Composition Committee has been reinstituted to develop the commissioning of new music. A Development Committee has been created to raise funds beyond the normal income from membership fees. The Investment Committee was formed to guide decisions about our endowment. The Publicity Committee was created to promote the Guild's programs internally and externally. A Special Projects Committee was set up with a budget to evaluate proposals for funding of various projects that could not be accomplished with funds from our regular budget. A new position of Membership Coordinator was established. Mission statements for these committees and all the Guild's committees were developed and can be found on our web site http://www.tcago.org. While you may not have observed many activities by these new committees, the effects of their work will be noticed in the years to come.

During the year the board members and committee chairs were requested to bring forth ideas and activities they would like to see TCAGO undertake. These were then included in a new process for creating next year's budget. As of this writing, the budget process is not complete. When the fiscal year ends, a complete budget and financial statement will be published.

We all should thank the retiring board members Dianne Jelle and Tom Ferry as well as Sub-Dean Karen Flynn for their energetic efforts on behalf of TCAGO.

Thanks should also be given to the officers, John Salveson, secretary, and David Geslin, treasurer, for their dedication to the efficient functioning of TCAGO.

Additional thanks needs to be directed toward board members, committee heads and committee members for their commitment to the work of this organization.


Thanks also to Barb Herzog and David Engen for their work on *Pipenotes* and the TCAGO web site respectively.

Challenges for the Future

This past year the board took on the task of calling those who were tardy in renewing their memberships. The number of calls that had to be made this year was double the number of the previous year. This takes considerable time and effort. I would hope the membership could be more attentive to the renewal process and allow the board to take such time to concentrate on other important work. As I have mentioned in my Dean's Column, increasing our membership should be an important goal for next year.

This increased membership will help us to balance our budget, something that has not been a feature of our finances for a number of years. We need to find a way to live within our means, to balance fixed costs while attending to the educational and professional needs of our members, developing opportunities for a social gatherings, as well as making the wider world aware of our work and value to society. Some difficult choices will have to be made.

The "Operating Procedures To Govern The Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists" is a document dated May 2001. It needs revision. A committee will be appointed to revise this document so that it can be presented to the board for its approval at its first meeting of the 2011-2012 season. ♬

TCAGO March Competition Winners

Six organists competed in the TCAGO competition on Sat. March 12 at Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church.

The first place winner was Katie Timm from Indiana University. After extensive studies in piano, Katie Timm began studying the organ in 2007 under Dr. James Freese of Concordia University Wisconsin. She continued study in 2008 under the tutelage of Dr. John Behnke of the same institution. In 2010 she graduated Concordia University Wisconsin with a BA in parish music, double emphasis in piano and organ, and was granted admittance to the Jacobs School of

Music, Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana as a student in the masters program in sacred music and organ performance. She currently studies at the Jacobs School of Music under Dr. Christopher Young and serves as director of music at University Lutheran Church, Bloomington, Indiana.

The second place winner was Andrew Schaeffer from St. Olaf College. A native of Chicago, Andrew Schaeffer began studying organ while in third grade with Dr. David Christiansen and continued his studies with Ruth Ann Poppen and later Margaret Kemper of Northwestern University. While in high school, Andrew served as Director of Music at Wilmette Lutheran Church in Wilmette, Illinois in addition to accompanying the Oak Park Concert Chorale, a semiprofessional mixed chorus based in Oak Park, Illinois. Further musical training was done at the Lutheran Summer Music Academy with Dr. Christiaan Teeuwsen. Andrew is currently a senior majoring in Church Music at St. Olaf College where he studies organ with Dr. John Ferguson and voice with Janis Hardy. While attending St. Olaf, Andrew has worked in several churches throughout the metro area, including All Saints Lutheran, Minnetonka, Epiphany Episcopal, Plymouth and currently as organ scholar at the Church of St. Louis King of France, St. Paul. Andrew has also accompanied and toured with the National Lutheran Choir based out of Minneapolis. Upon graduation, he intends on pursuing a Master of Music degree in organ performance.

The first prize of \$2,000 was sponsored by the Schubert Club of St. Paul and the second prize of \$1000 was sponsored by TCAGO member Philip Asgian. Judges for the competition were Chad Winterfeldt, Diana Lee Lucker and Allan Mahnke. J

"TCAGO through the Decades" 1960s, Part I

The front page of the April 1960 *Pipe Notes* issue announces " 'A New Suit for *Pipe Notes*.' Schmitt Music Co., Minneapolis, consented to produce and circulate our monthly newsletter."

Page two of this issue gives detail of the April 24, 1960 "AGO Pilgrimage to St. Cloud" and St. Mary's Cathedral. George Carthage, music director, writes about the choral and organ music program preceding a Solemn Mass in the evening. "Richard Proulx will play on the von Beckerath positive." He also played for the service.

May 9, 1960 was the date for our annual meeting/election of officers at First Congregational Church, Minneapolis. Patricia Porter, FAGO, was in charge of the program: "Concert Repertory Suitable for Services." Two people that we've seen at meetings this year were elected to the Executive Board in May 1960. L. Robert Wolf and Kathryn Ulvilden Moen deserve our applause for their many years of service to TCAGO.

1960-61 Season

Membership: 175

Our first meeting on October 1 was held at Zion Lutheran Church, 26th and Lyndale Ave., Minneapolis. There was dinner at 6:30 p.m. followed by a program that Pat Porter hosted. Tom Johnson was the organist.

As the first performer in the Artist Series, Wilbur Held played at House of Hope Presbyterian Church on October 16.

The November 13 meeting was our 50th Anniversary celebration held at Plymouth Congregational Church. See our TCAGO website, Archives, and note the program and menu information that were recently added.

Our January 20th, 1961 meeting was a joint meeting with Twin Cities Choirmasters Association (TCCA) and was held at House of Hope Church in St. Paul. Eugene Nordgren was the host. The Motet Choir sang the Magnificat in D by J. S. Bach followed by Paul Manz playing an organ recital.

We met at Northrop Auditorium, U. of MN, on February 25. Heinrich Fleischer spoke about Max Reger and then played his music.

On March 14, we met at Hamline Methodist Church to hear a student recital. We were at Normandale Lutheran Church on April 1, 1961. Ruth Jensen, choir director, provided a choral

program preceded by a report on salaries and working conditions of church musicians.

The Guild service at St. Mark's Cathedral on May 9th ended the season. Gerald Bales, Cathedral organist, and the choirs of the church performed.

1961-62 Season

Beginning October 1, 1961 our annual membership dues were raised to \$10.

On October 8, we had a combined meeting with TCCA at Wayzata Community Church. Willard Budnick the organist/ choir director was our host. After dinner at the church, we walked across the street to hear the new 18-rank Reuter at Wayzata Redeemer Lutheran Church.

The November 7 meeting was at Macalester Presbyterian Church. Richard Westenburg gave a lecture/recital on "The Nativity" by Olivier Messiaen.

On January 16, Evangeline Mitchell from Rochester, MN played a recital for TCAGO at Joyce Methodist Church in Minneapolis.

John Weaver was the Artist Series performer on January 21 at 1st Congregational in Mpls.

We went to Gustavus Adolphus College for our March 10 meeting. Along with TCCA, we heard Clarence Dickinson play an organ recital. [At the time, Clarence Dickinson was believed to be the last surviving Founder of the American Guild of Organists.] The college choir also performed, directed by Paul Allwardt. There was a buffet supper following the program. An informal discussion with Dr. Dickinson succeeded supper.

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

Lisztomania II, an all-Liszt commemorative concert will take place **Thursday**, **July 14**, **8:00 PM** at the Basilica of St. Mary, Minneapolis. After the success of Lisztomania I at the same venue February 25 which featured Liszt's transcription for organ from the Dante Symphony, his original organ version of Evocation of the Sistine Chapel, two organ transcriptions of late atonal pieces and the Missa Choralis for organ and choir, the large solo organ works will now be performed in July. For those attendees of Lisztomania I, please note the date change from that printed on the back of the February program.
