The hot link on person X will take you to his/her web page and the hot link on Church Y will take you to its web page where you probably will find a map and directions, something about parking, the organ and music program, *etc.* We would never be able to print all that information in a printed version of *Pipenotes.* We are also hoping our advertisers will take advantage of having a hot link in their ads that will take you directly to their websites.

The job listings will be posted only on the TCAGO website. This means quicker postings and removal if the job has been filled. The sub list also will be posted only on the TCAGO website. Those of you who depend upon the printed version of *Pipedreams* listings can find a printed version in TAO and electronically through the TCAGO and MPR websites.

A number of committees and others have been cooperating to make this new version of *Pipenotes* a reality: the Publicity Committee, an ad hoc Communications committee, the Program committee, John Salveson, Jeff Patry, Laura Edman, Jeff O'Donnell, David Geslin and of course Merritt Nequette. I would like to thank them all for plunging in to assist in making this newly revised *Pipenotes* a reality.

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A Wall Street Organist

In September 2005, I was hired by Trinity Church, Wall Street – a historic church that sits in the midst of Lower Manhattan's Financial District. My first Sunday was to play services for the fifth anniversary of 9/11/2001.

It was a humbling and moving experience to begin my service of music ministry in commemoration of all those who died and in honor of the many first responders, recovery workers and volunteers. "We will never forget" rings out as clear today as it did for me in 2005.

Trinity Wall Street is a church, but more than that – it's a non-profit corporation. Founded in 1696, Trinity was given a large parcel of land by Queen Anne which was roughly half of Lower Manhattan. It is because of that land that the church is one of the

largest real estate holders in Manhattan. Beyond Trinity Real Estate, Trinity Information Systems, Trinity Television and New Media, Human



Resources, Finance, and the many departments of program – comes a safe haven for many in Lower Manhattan who seek refuge from the difficult Wall Street demands.

On Ash Wednesday, we would generally see over 10,000 people who would come through the doors to receive the sacred ashes. Every day, thousands of tourists would come taking pictures in a nave that seats less than 550 people. This made organ practice seem more like a performance, especially for those who might even put their tourist video on YouTube. This is why the position of organist at Trinity Church was more like a pressure-cooker. On Sunday mornings, we would webcast all the liturgies. It always felt that if I were to make a mistake, it would be heard around the world. The webcasts truly are a useful tool to help other church musicians who need an opportunity to worship after playing at their own church and serve as a teaching tool for many - from improvisational tricks to repertoire.

My real joy of being a Wall Street organist was to start and develop a community youth choir. This past season we had nearly 250 students in the program. It was for me the greatest honor to give to those who will be the next future composers, directors of music, and the like.

There were a lot of wonderful memories – meeting and working with Cameron Carpenter; being asked by the Rector to "do something" in honor of Michael Jackson, Gerald Ford, James Brown for the Sunday postludes; meeting George H.W. Bush and Hillary Clinton; acting as the organist in the film *Doubt* starring Philip Seymour Hoffman and Meryl Streep; playing a digital organ that was the talk-ofthe-town; helping restore the pipe organs for Saint Paul's and All Saints Chapels; working with Frederica von Stade and Joyce DiDonato in the opera *Dead Man Walking;* and the quiet Sunday morning walk from the train station to the church.

I'm so humbled and honored to have the opportunity to share these experiences with other pastoral musicians like you. My family and I will treasure the old traditions of the East coast and bond with new joys of the Cathedral of Saint Paul, the choral Mecca of Minnesota, and the collegiality of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. I look forward to working and making music with many here and am happy to find another home where we can love God and our neighbor – near and far – for a world of good. God bless New York City, Minnesota, and the musical work we do to redeem the world. *Soli Deo Gloria!*

TCAGO Archive News

TCAGO through the Decades – 1960s, Part II

We continue our decade's parade where we left off, January 1963.

1962-63 Season, Continued

Our February 23, 1963 joint meeting with Twin Cities Choirmasters Association (TCCA) was at St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church in St. Paul. Dinner was at 6:15 in the Parish House. Rev. David Benson spoke briefly about music in the Episcopal Church. Evensong was at 8 p.m. in the church. The choir of St. John's sang and C. Wesley Anderson – organist/choir director – played works of Richard Purvis and Eric Thiman.

The Artist Series performer on March 5 was Edward Mondello, successor to Heinrich Fleischer at the University of Chicago. He played at St. Mark's Cathedral.

March 11 was the date of our next meeting held at the First Unitarian Society in Minneapolis. Works for organ and orchestra was the program. Earl Barr was the organist on the recently installed Holtkamp organ. Thomas Nee directed the orchestra.

The April meeting was at St. Clement's Episcopal Church in St. Paul. The organist/choir director, Larry King, spoke about English church music concentrating on music of the 16th and 17th centuries. The chamber choir from the church sang. [Larry King was our *Pipenotes* editor for a brief time. He came to the Twin Cities from New York City where he was the assistant to Alec Wyton at St. John the Divine Cathedral.]

Michael Schneider, eminent German organist, presented an organ recital at Northrop Auditorium on April 29, 1963.

[March and April was a combined issue of *Pipenotes*. May 1963 is missing.]

1963-64 Season

Our first meeting of the season was in October and was at Mt. Zion Temple, St. Paul. Rabbi Martin spoke on "The History of the Synagogue." The choir sang under the direction of Virginia Wetherbee Powell.

On November 24, our meeting was at Holy Childhood Church in St. Paul. Fernando Germani, the organist of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, played a recital.

On January 18, 1964 our joint meeting with TCCA was at Westminster Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis. Ed Berryman played and we sight read new choral anthems.

Our February 2 meeting was a dinner meeting at the University of Minnesota followed by a recital at Northrop Auditorium with David Craighead playing.

Heinrich Fleischer spoke to us about ornamentation in J.S. Bach's organ music. The meeting, March 7, was at Grace Lutheran Church on the U. of M. campus.

On April 17, 1964 we were at St. Mark's Cathedral where Gerald Bales and choirs featured music of local choral and organ composers. Mary Wilson directed several anthems.

Heinrich Fleischer played the dedication recital of the Westwood Lutheran Church Holtkamp organ

in St. Louis Park at 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. on May 17, 1964.

Our Annual Guild Service and dinner was held at Reformation Lutheran Church in St. Paul on May 24. Dr. A.O. Frank, pastor, delivered the sermon, "Worship in Song and Thanksgiving." Helen Billing, music director, [our sub-dean then] played Bach's *Prelude in C* and during the course of the liturgy, the choir sang three anthems.

1964-65 Season

[Merrill N. Davis, III became our Pipenotes editor.]

On September 20, we enjoyed a smorgasbord supper at the St. Paul Hotel. A program followed in the Capital Room.

Our meeting on October 25 was at Christ Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. The choir under the direction of Walter Pelz, sang the Bach motet, *Jesu*, *Priceless Treasure* accompanied by a brass and string ensemble.

Frederick Swann from the Riverside Church in New York City played a recital at Central Lutheran Church on October 27, 1964.

On November 13, 1964 we had a joint meeting with TCCA at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. After the 6:15 dinner, Norman Luboff was the featured speaker followed by Advent and Christmas music of contemporary Minnesota composers performed in the church by the Central Lutheran choir under the direction of Fred Hilary. Mrs. (Joyce) Hilary accompanied the choir and played several selections on the new 108-rank Casavant Organ.

Westwood Lutheran in St. Louis Park was the location of our January 15, 1965 meeting.

Ronald Nelson, director of music, was our host. A lecture/demonstration of the new Holtkamp Organ was given by Clark B. Angel. He was the organist/choir director of First Congregational Church and a faculty member of Wisconsin State Univ., Eau Claire.

James Welch is University Organist of Santa Clara University. He also serves as organist of St. Mark's

Episcopal Church, Palo Alto. He received the DMA degree in organ performance from Stanford University, with further studies in France and Austria. He has concertized internationally, with performances in such prestigious venues as Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, the Leipzig *Gewandhaus*, National



Cathedral in Washington DC, and the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City.

He has also performed and taught in Beijing, Taipei, Hong Kong, New Zealand, and Jerusalem. A particular interest of his is Latin American organ music. He received a Fulbright award to perform and conduct research in Brazil. Since then he has performed in Mexico and edited three volumes of organ music by Mexican composers.

He has performed at conventions of the American Guild of Organists and at the International Congress of Organists. His articles have appeared in *The American Organist* and *The Diapason;* and he has released numerous CDs, recorded on a variety of organs.

This will be the first time that James Welch has performed in Minnesota. Richfield United Methodist Church invites TCAGO members and friends to join in welcoming him.

The concert will be on Friday, September 16 at 7:30 pm. The church is located at 5835 Lyndale Ave S., Minneapolis. There will be a free-will offering and a reception will follow the concert.
