James Callahan The TCAGO Board and its committees have been working hard at revising its governance documents and giving attention to its endowment.

TCAGO's Operating Procedures document was last revised in 2001. A committee consisting of David

Geslin, Sharon Kleckner, Jane Nienaber and myself undertook the effort to revise and update it. The revised document has been approved by the Board. The general membership also must approve this document. The approval mechanism will take place in the Spring in connection with the ballot that will come your way to elect a new Board. If approved, we anticipate implementation of the new Operating Procedures will take place on July 1, 2012, the beginning of our fiscal year.

The Investment Committee, after much thought, research and having interviewed five people, has come to the conclusion that it is in our best interest to engage an investment advisor to assist us in the management of our endowment. The committee recommended Michael Wright as our advisor. The Board has accepted this recommendation. More about policies that are being developed and information on Mr. Wright will be forthcoming in future *Pipenotes*.

I have heard from a number of members who have chosen to receive the paper version of *Pipenotes* but have indicated they are not receiving it. (I hope you are reading this on line.) Please let me know if you are one of those who are not receiving the paper version you requested. We will have to try to figure out what the problem is.

Last spring I challenged each TCAGO member to recruit at least one new member for the 2011-2012 season. Sad to say, it appears only a few took up that challenge. If we are to have a viable and lively organization, it is essential that everyone participate in recruitment efforts. Might I suggest that a gift of a membership could be a dandy stocking stuffer. 

Bálint Karosi at Central Lutheran – January 22

On Sunday, January 22, Central Lutheran Church in downtown Minneapolis will host a recital by the marvelous young Hungarian organist Bálint Karosi. Concert time is 4:00 p.m. The event is free and open to the public. Parking in Central's adjacent ramp will be validated for the event. A wine and cheese reception follows in the church's South Commons. Central Lutheran is located at 333 South Twelfth Street across from the Minneapolis Convention Center.

Karosi's program includes works by J.S. Bach, César Franck, Franz Liszt, Olivier Messiaen and Louis Vierne. The program will conclude with an improvisation on a submitted theme.

Bálint Karosi (pronounced BAH-leent KAH-rohshee) hails from Budapest, Hungary. He is a versatile

musician performing on the organ, clarinet, historical clarinet and harpsichord. Bálint studied at the Liszt Academy in Budapest, at the *Conservatoire Superieure de Genève* and at the Oberlin Conservatory, earning two master's degrees, two *Prix de Virtuosité* and both an Artist Diploma and a Mas-



ter of Music in Historical Performance. He has won many prizes at prestigious international competitions including the First Prize of the XVI International Johann Sebastian Bach Competition in Leipzig, Germany, first prize and the audience prize at the Dublin International Organ Competition, the first prize at the Arthur Poister Organ Competition and the first and audience prize of the Miami International Organ Competition.

Bálint is a versatile composer, and his compositions have been well-received in Europe and the United States. This led to a commission of his *Consonances Concerto for Organ and Symphony Orchestra* for the new organ at the National Concert Hall in Budapest. He was featured as a soloist-composer on June 28, 2007. The recording of this concert can be heard on American Public Media's *Pipedreams* in a national broadcast on public radio stations around the country. His compositions are published by Wayne Leupold Editions Ltd.

As the Organist and Director of Music at the First Lutheran Church in Boston, Bálint leads an international concert series and regular performances of Bach Cantatas. An accomplished clarinetist, Bálint won second prize at the Prague Spring International Clarinet Competition in 2002. He is an active chamber musician regularly playing clarinet and harpsichord in various orchestras and chamber ensembles in the Boston area. He plays historical clarinet with the Boston Baroque.

Bálint was awarded the 2009 *Prima Primissima* Juior Prize for Music, which is a recommendationbased cash prize for the most distinguished artists in Hungary.

Review of Paul Jacobs' recital at Bethlehem Lutheran Church on Nov. 13

It is unusual to have a front-page review (Arts section) of a solo organ recital. This appeared in the St. Paul Pioneer Press on November 14.

Jacobs' insight, imagination, dedication on hightech display

How does an instrumentalist reach the peak of his profession at the age of 34? Perhaps that's what some of those who filled every seat Sunday afternoon at Minneapolis' Bethlehem Lutheran Church wanted to know.

They were there to experience a recital by organist Paul Jacobs, whose resume includes being the youngest department head in the history of New York's prestigious Juilliard School and the winner of the most recent "Best Instrumental Soloist" Grammy - the first organist to do so. What they discovered was what happens when a tremendous musical imagination meets an over-the-top work ethic.

Jacobs is a virtuoso who knows how to balance interpretive insight with bravura showmanship. Each piece he played was full of intriguing ideas, be he bringing a fresh take to a tricky and transparent Trio Sonata by J.S. Bach or splicing an Edward Elgar sonata with the composer's familiar "Pomp and Circumstance."

But he also brought the audience to sound worlds too seldom visited, summoning up the spirit of traditional gospel on a suite by Florence Price and bringing clarity to the dense note clusters in Jeanne Demessieux etudes.

Visually, the concert was an unusual experience, in that Jacobs was performing in the organ loft at the back of the Bethlehem sanctuary, his performance projected onto a screen up by the altar. The closedcircuit experience proved a welcome one, for it presented a horizontal split-screen view of Jacobs' gracefully fluid fingers and his footwork on the bass pedals.

Kudos to the Bethlehem Music Series for bringing this master organist to the Twin Cities and presenting him for the price of a free-will offering. His recitals elsewhere often are under the auspices of major symphony orchestras, so snaring him was clearly a coup.

TCAGO through the Decades – 1960s, Part IV

1967-68 Season

On October 7, 4:00 p.m., we met at Carleton College and heard a lecture by Dr. Henry Woodward [music professor at Carleton] on "Editions of Organ Music." We ate dinner at 6:00 p.m. and then heard a short recital given by David Baker, Carleton senior and winner of a local organ playing contest.

There's an *In Memoriam* in the October 1967 *Pipenotes* for a founding member of our AGO Chapter. Stanley Avery who was at St. Mark's Cathedral from 1910 to 1950, and on the faculty at MacPhail School of Music from 1916 to 1966, died on September 17, 1967. He was 87.

We met on November 10 at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis. The meeting was a hymn festival. "Several organists will be playing the organ (even two or three at once, perhaps?)" [There are missing *Pipenotes* issues for November, December 1967 and January, February, March of 1968.]

The March 30, 1968 meeting was at First Covenant Church in St. Paul. We combined with Twin Cities Choirmasters Association to hear a program of "rare beauty." Harry Opel, our host, prepared his choir and the Minnehaha Singers in César Franck's *Mass in A.* Afterwards, James Davis led an anthemreading session.

We were at St. Olaf College for our April 19 meeting. There was a 6:30 dinner in the new Student Center preceding a performance of the St. Olaf Chapel Choir, conducted by Mrs. Enid Woodward. Robert Kendall of the St. Olaf music faculty played an organ recital. [Mrs. Woodward, organ professor at Carleton College, was the Visiting Professor of Music that semester. She was filling in for Kenneth Jennings.]

The annual Guild Service with election of officers was held on May 5, 1968 at the Basilica of St. Mary. [Unfortunately, there was no more information in *Pipenotes* about the service.]

1968-69 Season

Our first meeting of the season was on October 15, 1968. It was billed as "An Evening with the Mammoth Organ of the Minneapolis Auditorium." We were invited to spend an evening hearing and playing the organ(s) of the Minneapolis Auditorium from 7:30-9:30. Dr. Edward Berryman (our dean) demonstrated the 116-rank W.W. Kimball, four-manual concert console on the north side. Clyde Olson demonstrated the four-manual theater console on the south side. Afterwards, we gathered for refreshments at the Curtis Hotel.

We ended last month's "Decades" article with news of Gerald Bales' injury from an attack at St. Mark's Cathedral on February 18, 1967. He's listed in the October 1968 *Pipenotes* as playing the dedication recital of the 17-rank Wicks Organ at First Congregational Church in Robbinsdale. In November and December, he played organ concerts in five Canadian cities. During his absence, Ted Gillen, assistant organist/choir director at St. Mark's, played and conducted.

"Gala Fall Organ Crawl" was the notice for meeting on November 3, 1968. Two new instruments would be heard: University Lutheran Church of Hope, Minneapolis, 7-8 p.m. with Margaret Sihler Anderson playing and answering questions, and Westwood Lutheran in St. Louis Park, 8:30, with Ronald Nelson, director of music.

On November 8, TCCA & AGO had a joint dinner meeting at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Edina. Our host, John Mitcheltree, gave a lecture/demonstration of boychoir techniques. Each boy could sing any of three voice parts at will. An anthem-reading session followed.

We were encouraged to attend three lecture/ recitals on January 17, 23, 26 in 1969 at Janet Wallace fine Arts Center. The organ music of J.S. Bach was the subject presented by Dr. Peter LeHuray, professor of music history at King's College in Cambridge England. He was a visiting professor at Macalester College.

We met at Macalester College again when Dr. LeHuray spoke at our March 11 dinner meeting. He told of his work as acting choral director at King's College Chapel, Cambridge England. Rehearsal techniques were demonstrated with phonograph records and BBC broadcast tapes.

Robert Kendall, organ instructor at St. Olaf College, announced an organ recital by James Higdon, senior at St. Olaf. The recital took place at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, 41st and Lyndale So., Minneapolis, on April 13, 1969 at 4:00 p.m. He played works of Alain, Bach, Dupré, and Vierne. According to *Pipenotes*, "Mr. Higdon is planning to study in Europe next year. He was a finalist in the 1968 Fort Wayne organ competition."

On April 29th, we had a "Dutch treat" dinner at 6:00 pm at Becky's Cafeteria on Hennepin and Franklin. After dinner, we met at Plymouth Congregational Church where Arthur Jennings shared memories of his career as the U. of M. organ professor from 1939-56, his 28 years as organist/choir director at Plymouth Congregational Church, and his career prior to coming to Minnesota.

The Annual Guild Service and election of officers was held on May 18 at Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church. Dr. Chester Pennington, pastor, led worship. The adult choir sang Benjamin Britten's *Jubilate Deo* and Zoltan Kodály's *Psalm 114.* A brass quartet from the Minnesota Orchestra accompanied the choir in the premiere performance of Gerald Near's anthem, "Let All the World in Every Corner Sing."

1969-70 Season

September 14 was the date of our first meeting of the season. *Pipenotes* said: "Come to our opening reception or tea in the Art Room of Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church... It will be a time of getting acquainted featuring Richard Waggoner, our host and new Dean, in a short talk; Richard Zgodava playing a mini-recital on the Sabathil harpsichord; and William Kling and J. Michael Barone, manager and program director respectively of the FM fine arts radio network of St. John's University, telling of their work."

Maurice and Marie-Madeleine Duruflé from Paris were here on September 26 and 27 for the Central Lutheran Church organ festival and symposium.

Here's the heading for the October 5 meeting... Features Bus Trip, Recital, Tours and Dinner at One of the Great Churches of our Hemisphere. Father Gerard Farrell OSB played a recital for the AGO and the TCCA on the organ of St. John's University and Abbey Church, Collegeville, MN. The November Pipenotes said that over 100 persons attended this event.

Our last meeting of the decade was an organ recital that we sponsored. It was played by Edgar Hilliar at St. Mark's Cathedral on November 18, 1969. Mr. Hilliar came from Mount Kisco, New York where he was organist/choir director of St. Mark's Episcopal Church. He had studied with E. Power Biggs and had been a member of the National Council of the AGO.


