AGO REGION VI CONVENTION REPORT

Over 160 organists and exhibitors, including several TCAGO members. attended the 2003 Regional Convention in St. Joseph, Missouri from June 15-18. We had the opportunity to hear several outstanding recitalists ranging from 17year-old Felix Hell to hearing the last public performance of Dr. Bruce Prince-Joseph who is retiring after over 60 years of making music. Another recital was performed by Christopher Jacobson, the Region VI Competition Winner.

We heard historic instruments as well as the beautiful 1996 Wolff mechanical action organ in Bales Hall at the University of Kansas (UK) and the 1999 Bigelow organ at

Conception Abbey. Four commissioned works were presented: an organ partita and 2 choral anthems for morning prayer and a larger choral work for the opening concert. We had lunch on the lawn at UK while hearing an outstanding carillon recital by Dr. Elizabeth Egbert Berghout. Some of us even climbed the 77 steps up the winding stairway to watch and learn about the carillon.

Workshops covered such topics as teaching beginners at the keyboard, Gregorian chant, creative use of the choir in hymn singing, book reviews on organs, choral reading sessions, making efficient use of practice time, and professional development issues.



ARCHIVE NEWS

An archivist has a responsibility to preserve the past by maintaining and storing materials that will be available for the future. The Organ Historical Society (www.organsociety.org) has a large repository of organ research materials located at the Talbott Library of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. The Boston AGO Chapter has an archival library (www.organlibrary.com) at Boston University. It was established at the University in 1985. The donations from the estates of T. Tertius Noble and especially E. Power Biggs in 1980 initiated the need for a permanent home of a constantly accumulating collection.

The TCAGO archives are constantly accumulating too. Our permanent home is the Minnesota Historical Society Library. In a climate-controlled environment, our past is preserved and maintained by professional librarians. Say, for example, that you have an interest in seeing a back issue of *Pipenotes*. You'll find it in the Minnesota Historical Library. Issues date from 1955-1995 on microfilm. Issues after 1995 are in hard copy (paper).

If you have Internet access, look at www.mnhs.org/library/findaids/0017.html to see an inventory of our records.

We're glad to have a home for our archives that provides consistency, preservation and continuity of our history. Researchers will find membership directories, minutes, committee files, correspondence, concert and recital programs, etc. The Overview of the collection dates our records from 1910 – 2001. This library is selective though. In March of 2002 I

delivered two bankers boxes of items. Several months later, after the material was inventoried and cataloged, I was asked to retrieve a half box of returns. The library is interested in items of historical interest for purposes of research. Some of our archives don't qualify for library inclusion, especially National AGO items, duplicates and financial information except for annual reviews. On January of 2003, I delivered three bankers boxes. Two were returned and the third is waiting to be cataloged – budget consideration has slowed down the review and cataloging process. When cataloged, none of the items circulate. They are for reference use only at the Historical Society.

We have archival items that are free floating. Currently, they reside in my storage room. Some of my effort this past year has been to find a location that would accept our floating library. Temperature controlled storage was investigated, but monthly costs were prohibitive. In an informal way, I've checked at an academic library, but space was not available. We'll continue to search for possible sites.

I'm writing this month not only to be informational but to also request from our membership archival items that are valuable additions to our TCAGO history. Let me know what you have, but please be aware of the lack of storage for our floating library, and that items may not be accepted by our permanent home. Without hesitation though, I would request missing membership directories for these years (they're missing at the Historical Society Library): 1965/66, 1967/68, 1969/70, 1985/86, 1992/93 and 1994/95.

For those who are looking for positions, there are often several weeks between the time a position is open and the date it is published in *PIPENOTES*. From time to time a congregation is in immediate need. Those of you who would like to have your name suggested to a congregation can leave your name and number with Robert Anderson. His function will be to give a congregation a list of available candidates.

Reflections on the Congregational Song-2002 and 2003

III. Suggestions

"Might it be possible that the arts, in return for having been given a home for centuries upon past centuries, at this moment, ...could halt the pervasive appeal to humankind's mediocrity and hypocrisy, might even restore worship to a consideration of God's mystery and humankind's dignity?" Robert Shaw.

Some Issues

- 1. **Architecture.** Has the worship space of your building been designed to allow the liturgy (work) to occur? Or was the sanctuary designed to accommodate members who "**sit** and listen to the sermon?" Does it have a warm and cozy atmosphere, with cushioned pews, with carpeting to muffle walking and talking, with wall furnishings to muffle extra sounds, and with a sound system to present "the Word" from the pulpit? And when you sing hymns, do you feel unsupported, feel like you are singing alone?
- 2. **The singing voice**. There is a lack of confidence in the use of a singing voice of many of the younger members of the con-

gregation, or even members of all ages. The voices of Nat King Cole, Bing Crosby, Julie Andrews, etc., presented much better models than the singers of the contemporary "popular music" of today.

ORGAN VIRTUOSO TO PERFORM AT ST. PAUL'S UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

Robert Vickery, who has built both a local and national reputation for his stunning musical work on the organ, will be performing a free concert at St. Paul's United Church of Christ in St. Paul on **Sunday afternoon** (3:00 p.m.), **September 7**. The concert will be a celebration in rededicating St. Paul's nearly 90-year old church organ, and is open to the public.

Mr. Vickery began his formal musical training at age 7 and was appointed to his first organ position when only 12 years old.

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He later studied organ at the University of Minnesota and considers the late Virgil Fox to have been the artist who most influenced his playing style. Mr. Vickery is currently the organist at the Church of the Holy Childhood in St. Paul, and has also held organist positions with Messiah Methodist in Wayzata and Westminster Presbyterian and the Basilica of St. Mary, both in Minneapolis. He has also served as accompanist for all of the major choral organizations at the University of Minnesota and since 1997, has accompanied the University of St. Thomas Concert Choir and Chamber Singers.

Vickery debuted his organ mastery on the New York City scene in 1983, and he has had performances broadcast nationally by Public Radio on its syndicated program, "Pipedreams." He earned raves for his recordings that feature the organs of the Cathedral of St. Paul in St. Paul, the Cathedral of St. Mark in Minneapolis and the 85-rank Aeolian organ at the Watkins Mansion in Winona, Minnesota. He's a long-term member of the American Guild of Organists and is the president of the Organ Historical Society's local chapter.

St. Paul's United Church of Christ is nearly 125 years old, and its magnificent pipe organ was built and installed by Wicks in 1915. Additional pipes and chimes were added in 1939; the organ was moved to its current church location on St. Paul's historic Summit Avenue in 1952, and has been upgraded a



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number of times since then. The Robert Vickery Concert is St. Paul's rededication of its organ as part of its annual Rally Day celebration on September 7. The concert begins at 3:00 pm with seating for up to 1,100 people, and ample nearby parking. There is no admission charge as a free will offering will be received.

There will be a reception following the concert in the fireside room

- 3. **Instrumental accompaniment** to support the congregation. Within the framework of the building, is the instrument used to accompany the congregation adequate? Is the placement where it will support the singers?
- 4. **The role of "contemporary" music** as congregational song. The singing style of "contemporary" music tends to be soloistic. How can a congregation of 400+, or of any size, be expected to sing anything more than a simple refrain of "love the Lord," or a similar type of text? Can three guitars, piano, drums, solo singer with some backup singers be an effective way to support congregational singing?

Let's make it work

- 1. Make the selection of hymns a team effort, involving the clergy and musicians. There are plenty of materials with lists of hymns that are appropriate to the Lectionary for the day. Also plan ahead enough so the organist and the choir director can include the hymn in the planning of the music for a worship service, a prelude based on the hymn tune, an anthem based on the hymn tune.
- 2. Rather than Hymn of the Month, have a **Hymn of the Season**. What wonderful options when viewed this way. During the fall, there could be an opportunity to have the congregation learn a couple of great hymns for weddings, "As Man and Woman, we were made" and "When Love is found," (both in the Methodist Hymnal). Instead of the bride's favorite uncle, or the groom's younger sister singing accompanied by a karoke tape, the whole congregation could stand up and say (sing), "As man and woman we were made that love be found and life begun, so praise the Lord who made us two, and praise the Lord when two are one...."
- 3. As part of **Hymn of the Season**, select a NEW hymn. While some of the younger, newer members might not know what we consider a traditional hymn, let's move ahead. Select a new hymn, and then use the hymn in a variety of ways over a period of time. Provide some instruction so the congregation understands the text. Uses:
 - a. Call to Worship
 - b. Anthem settings
 - c. Descants
 - d. Organ prelude music based on the hymn
 - e. Use the new hymn during the service. Have the congregation read aloud the text prier to singing.
- 4. Playing hymns. All of us know that repetition leads to boredom. Then why are hymns played in a "boring" way? At least vary the registration. And if you are not comfortable improvising an accompaniment, there are plenty of good collections of free accompaniments.

- a. **Hymns for Choirs**, arranged by David Willcocks (Oxford University Press)
- b. Free Organ Accompaniments to Well-Known Hymns by T. Tertius Noble (J. Fischer)
- c. **Fifty Free Organ Accompaniments**, T. Tertius Noble (J. Fischer)
- d. **Hymn Tune Harmonizations, books I IV**, John Ferguson (Ludwig Music)
- e. **Varied Accompaniments**, by Eric Thiman (Oxford University Press)
- f. **Organ Accompaniments**, by Edward C. Bairstow (Oxford University Press)

To help with planning the music for the service, I created a computer file to assist with hymn playing. When I knew what the hymns were going to be, I would look up by title to find materials to vary the accompaniment. Example:

Fortunately we have Paul Manz to thank for being a leader and role model. In John Ferguson's setting of **Lasst Uns erfreuen**, he composed an introduction of 8 measures and then suggested an accompaniment to fit the setting of each stanza, Stanza 1-Men only, Stanza 2-Organ, Stanza 3-Women, Stanza 4 – All voices and full accompaniment

5. Use anthems based on hymn tunes. Examples:

Once in Royal David's City - The setting follows the pattern suggested above. Solo voice on 1st verse; descant on next to last verse, full organ on last verse.

Thine Be the Glory - for handbells, brass, organ, choir. A good setting for Easter.

Lift High the Cross - In the setting, the congregation sings the refrain with the choir. Verse one has a bass/tenor descant, the verse 2 setting is for four part choir, verse 3 is for male voices on the melody with a descant. A couple of the refrains have a soprano descant.

At the Name of Jesus - a setting composed by Vaughan Williams.

- 6. In singing the precessional hymn, have the choir stand in the aisles until at least half way through the last verse, same on recessional. Instead of just the center aisle, spread out into the side aisles as well. Let the choir support the congregation.
- 7. Invite any of the non-singers to come in and help them find their voice. Listen to their speaking voice and then have them move into a sing/song pattern similar to the speaking voice

and at the pitch of the speaking voice. Then find that range, which might be low, might be high, and have them try singing a simple pattern at that pitch level. Maybe you will find a low bass for choir. The first time I auditioned for a choir, I thought I was a bass. The director vocalized me up to a high B flat. He laughed. I thought I had done something wrong, so I asked him, "Did I make the choir?" He again laughed and said, "You sure did!"

8. Try to begin hymn singing in the Christian Education program as well as adult education. Begin and end each class with a hymn. And introduce new hymns.

Make it important and it will happen. And plan. □

An organ recital, "Organ Music of Three Twentieth-Century Composers and J. S. 
Arthur Honneger (1892-1955) wrote *King David* as incidental music for an avant-garde play by Rene Morax that was first staged in Switzerland in 1921. The music was such a success that he was immediately encouraged to adapt the work for the concert stage. To better integrate the story line with the music, the VocalEssence concert will include elements of spoken word, dance and multimedia with soloists Maria Jette, Lisa Drew and David Lee Brewer, the 100-voice VocalEssence Chorus and Philip Brunelle conducting the original 17-piece orchestration.

Three narrator/actors, Isabell Monk O'Connor, Richard Ooms and Nathaniel Fuller, will carry the story forward, using a fresh version of the narration written especially for VocalEssence by stage director Jon Cranney.

The Biblical story of David is marked by vivid contrasts, and is expressed in many of the Psalms, which Honegger selected as the main texts for the chorales in *King David*.

Honneger was only 29 years old when he wrote *King David*. As he remarked in 1951, "From a vantage point of thirty years, I can look at this music very objectively. It is written with complete spontaneity and without any regard for the fashionable. It is possible to trace in it the influences of musicians of my time and above all, undisguised, that of the greatest of the masters, J. S. Bach. Its reception after the first performance confirmed me in my intentions to create an art that addresses itself directly to everyone, trained musicians as well as the listeners who make up the great mass of the public."

VocalEssence artistic director Philip Brunelle says, "We've added dance, multimedia and a new narration so that this



wonderful music and dramatic story will be immediately accessible to our audience. We know that many people are not very familiar with the entire Biblical story of David, so we want to make this production as vivid and exciting as we can."



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THOMAS HEYWOOD IN MAHTOMEDI

The critically acclaimed Australian organist Thomas Heywood will perform in concert on the IV/108 1927 Casavant/Schantz organ at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church in Mahtomedi on **Monday evening**, **September 15**, **2003** at **7:30 pm**. 10 , 2004 at Plymouth Congregational Church in Minneapolis. Composers may write for SATB chorus (or variations thereof) and up to 15 instruments. Those selected to participate will hear their work-in-progress rehearsed by the VocalEssence Ensemble Singers and then performed in a reading session with the Ensemble Singers, professional orchestra musicians, conductor Philip Brunelle, composer-mentor Sven-David Sandström. and VocalEssence/Meet The Composer composer-in-residence Cary John Franklin. The program includes mentoring sessions with Philip Brunelle and Sven-David Sandström.

The program attracts submissions from across the United States. In previous years, composers from New York, Indiana, Virginia, Georgia, New Mexico and Minnesota traveled to Minneapolis to participate in **Essentially Choral**.

As one composer remarked after last year's session, "In composition, instrumentation and orchestration classes we learn the nature of each individual instrument, how to write for those instruments and ultimately how to write for large groups of instruments. However, we do not learn about the human voice. As I heard my choral music being read, I learned that choir needs to be treated in a special way. I feel the only way for the modern composer to learn about choir is through experiences like this one."

Essentially Choral affirms the ongoing commitment of VocalEssence and the American Composers Forum to the work of today's composers and the performance of their music. The program is generously supported by a grant from the Jerome Foundation.
