Composers, representing three centuries of creative energy, include **William Albright** (1944-1998), **Samuel Barber** (1910-

1981), Rene **Becker** (1882-1956). Mary Beth Bennett (b. 1954). Craig Carnahan (b. 1951), Nancy Plummer Faxon (1914-2005), Alfred

1953), Porter Heaps (1906-1999), John Knowles Paine (1839-1906), Alice Parker (b. 1925), and John Weaver (b. 1937).

The featured instrument is a 30-rank mechanical-action pipe organ installed by the celebrated Massachusetts firm of **C. B. Fisk, Inc.** in 2004. The recital performers include:

Dr. Charles Echols: earned the M.M. degree from the University of Texas at Austin and the D.M.A. degree from the University of Southern California. He has studied in Toulouse, France, and also with Harald Vogel at the North German Organ Academy. He was Professor of Music at St. Cloud State University from 1972 until his retirement this spring. Echols served as Director of Music at St. Mary's Cathedral of St. Cloud for twenty-five years. He has performed all ten of the organ symphonies of Charles-Marie Widor and the six organ symphonies of Vierne in a series of faculty concerts at SCSU.

Laura Edman: a member of the TCAGO Executive Board and an active substitute organist in the Twin Cities. Most recently she served for thirteen years at The Church of St. Michael in Stillwater. Her teachers have included Heinrich Fleischer, Russell Saunders and Robert Luther. Currently a

She has participated in the Sacred Music Organ Week at Yale University and was one of a select dozen students from an international pool selected for the 2003 London Organ Summer Course. This summer she moved to the Twin Cities to pursue a Music Therapy Internship with Park Nicollet Health Services.

Kelley Whittier: studied organ at William and Mary College and Emory University. Her teachers have included Kim Kasling, Timothy Albrecht, David Jenkins and James Darling. She has lived and worked in Vienna, Austria, immediately following graduation from Emory in 2000, serving as a substitute organist throughout the city, as well as playing several concerts. For two years she worked as full-time Director of Music and Liturgy at St. Philip Benizi Catholic Church in Jonesboro, Georgia. She is member of a new private association, *Sisters in Jesus the Lord*, preparing to become a Roman Catholic sister to help Catholics in far-eastern Russia (Vladivostok).



The mechanical action organ has two manuals and 39 stops. The organ is a collaboration between German organ-builder Caspar von Glatter-Götz and American tonal designer/ voicer Manual Rosales (The two men collaborated most recently in the building of the organ in the Walt Disney Concert Hall, Los Angeles.). The case was designed by architect Graham Tristram, Edinburgh, Scotland.

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The organ project at the Nikolai Church in Flensburg, which Mr. Mages oversees and envisioned with the organ builder, Gerald Woehl, when complete, will receive worldwide attention. It will consist of an 18th century Schnitger-style organ and a Cavaille-Coll-style symphonic organ within one case, with two separate consoles and two separate tuning systems.

Michael Mages has produced a CD of hymn improvisations with a saxophonist for the publication, *Ton-Wort-Farbe*, which brings together the arts and theology to deepen our understanding of the Lutheran liturgy.



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French Organ Music Featured in Recital - Stephen Self



The organ at First Lutheran is a two-manual, 44-rank organ built by Charles Hendrickson Organ Co. of St. Peter. At this last Hymn Festival, the congregation will have the privilege of hearing the American premiere of an organ solo written for Michael Mages by Hans-Joachim Marx entitled *Te Deum*, based on the hymn "Grosser Gott." The congregation will join the organist and a brass ensemble from Gustavus Adolphus College in the singing of a verse from the hymn.

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Chorus America recognizes VocalEssence with ASCAP/Chorus America Award for Adventurous Programming at annual conference

On Friday, June 3, 2005 at the Chorus America National conference in Chicago, Philip Brunelle and VocalEssence received the 2005 American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers/Chorus America Award for Adventurous Programming of Choral Music. Minnesota composer Stephen Paulus made the presentation on behalf of ASCAP.

VocalEssence artistic director Philip Brunelle was surprised and pleased to accept the award. "I am delighted that we have received this award for an unprecedented fifth time – no other chorus in the country has been so honored. We are very grateful to ASCAP and Chorus America for the award and for their support of contemporary music."

"How exciting that Minnesota's rich choral tradition continues to be recognized on a national level," Brunelle added, noting that the Margaret Hillis Award presented on June 2 to The Rose Ensemble, based in St. Paul. VocalEssence was honored with the once-in-an-organizational-lifetime Margaret Hillis Achievement Award for Choral Excellence in 1996.

In keeping with its core mission to present new and rarely heard works for voices and instruments, VocalEssence received the Award for Adventurous Programming the first year it was offered, in 1992, and again in 1994, 1997 and 2002.

Founded in 1969 as the Plymouth Music Series, VocalEssence explores music for voices and instruments under the enthusiastic leadership of conductor Philip Brunelle.

VocalEssence launches it 37th season with a Royal visit, two major world premieres and a finale concert by legendary baritone Håkan Hagegård. Season tickets are on sale now and can be ordered by calling 612-624-2345. □
