Field Trip Adventure

TCAGO Organ Crawl: Minneapolis Organ Sampler Saturday, April 15, 9:00 a.m. – 4:45 p.m.

The **Pipe Organ Heritage Committee** of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists is sponsoring a free 'organ crawl' to seven interesting instruments in Minneapolis, beginning in Dinkytown and moving north to churches on or near University Avenue. Three morning and four afternoon venues will involve pipe organs of various styles dating from 1890 to 2021. The public is invited to join at any point along the way—enjoy the entire day's adventure or cherry-pick to participate at any time throughout the morning or afternoon. A brief demonstration of each instrument will be provided, in some cases by resident musicians and in other cases by volunteers from the 'crawl' group. After demonstrations, a period of 'open consoles' will make the organs briefly available to qualified folks who have brought along music to play.

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Dean's Column

DAVID JENKINS

These past two months have been very rich with organ recitals and related offerings, it seems that the organ scene is back in full force. I'd like to offer some



reflections on three of the recent organ performances that were enhanced by some kind of accompanying lecture or workshop.

The first was the solo recital by Jean-Baptiste Robin, presented by The Church of Saint Mark on February 27. The following evening the chapter sponsored Robin in a workshop at the Chapel of St. Thomas at the University of St. Thomas. The recital was brilliant as expected, presenting a great range of music from early French to Franck and Widor, and concluding with an improvisation. Upon reflection, however, my appreciation for the recital was increased even more by the workshop, which introduced us to Robin's *esprit*, his joy in performing music, and his unique integration of scholarship and profound musical expression.

I learned that I have been approaching the performance and teaching of French Baroque organ music the wrong way! For many years I have taught the style the same way that I was taught, by breaking down the elements of the music into distinct categories—ornamentation, articulation, notes inégales, registration—then piecing these elements back together in performance. Instead of this fragmented approach, however, Robin starts with the ornamentation as the integrative key to unlocking everything else. The ornamentation is founded in the vocal style of the time, a particular way of expressing the beauty of melodic lines based not only on a unique toolset of ornaments, but also on a kind of freedom of tempo and

rhythm, all carried by the breath. Everything else about the music flows out of the singing style: articulation, phrasing, rhythm, registration, and expression of mood. Robin demonstrated all of this by singing many musical examples, as well as by playing them. I can only imagine what insights a longer period of study with him could reveal.

Integration was also the byword of the lecture-recital by Thomas Fielding on Henri Mulet's *Byzantine Sketches*, performed at St. Olaf Catholic Church on March 7. As introduction to his performance, Dr. Fielding gave a fascinating lecture on the background of Mulet and on the suite that contains his famous *Tu es Petra*. He then performed the entire set of ten pieces. The opportunity to hear them all live in one sitting is rare indeed, and St. Olaf's beautiful Lively-Fulcher organ was an ideal medium.

Fielding's lecture encompassed a range of topics that set the context for Mulet's life and musical work, including the history of the Catholic Church in France, French political and social history, theology, spirituality, and architecture. All of this was illustrated with slides of portraits of a variety of relevant historical figures. I already had images of the Byzantine-inspired Basilica of Sacré-Cœur in my mind. (For goodness' sake, we have tacky coasters with the image in our living room, souvenirs of a trip to Paris!) However, I had little notion of the origins of the devotion to the Sacred Heart, and its importance in French ecclesiastical, political, and musical history. The lecture certainly deepened my appreciation for the captivating performance that followed.

Peter Richard Conte's brilliant live organ accompaniment to Fritz Lang's 1927 silent film *Metropolis* was another highpoint in the feast of recent organ events. Performed before a large audience at Northrop on the afternoon of March 19, the music provided totally engrossing, tonally rich, and technically seamless support to the ground-breaking science fiction film. The next evening, a much smaller audience gathered in the organ studio in the U. of M.'s Ferguson Hall for the opportunity to hear Mr. Conte talk about his approach to accompanying *Metropolis* on Northrop's Æolian-Skinner organ, and to hear his general reflections on techniques and aesthetics for accompanying silent films. It was quite fascinating to hear him break down

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his preparation into discreet steps. These included watching the film so many times that he knew by heart what would happen next, preparing a scene-by-scene script, choosing the themes or motifs that expressed each scene, noting the places for special effects or percussive sounds, exploring all of the divisions and stops on the Northop organ, setting general and divisional pistons so that he knew just exactly how to access the sounds he wanted, improvising on the themes apart from the film to test his settings and refresh his themes, and, finally, rehearsing with the film to get the flow of the entire thing. This is a two-and-a-half-hour film, with a dynamic range of action and emotion. I'm out of breath describing his process, much less imagining how anyone has the endurance and focus to do it! Once again, getting an up-close glimpse of the methods and personality of the performer enhanced my appreciation for his superb artistry.

Maria Bucka is a life-long musician having received degrees in both piano and organ performance and in vocal music education at the University of Minnesota. Her piano teachers have included Marguerite Astroth and Bernhard Weiser; Organ study has been with Paul Manz, Daniel Chorzempa, Heinrich Fleischer, Gerald Bales, and Larry Smith.



While at the University of Minnesota, she was the piano accompanist for the University Chorus for four years and she was twice a piano finalist for the Women's Association of the Minnesota Symphony Orchestra, performing with the University of Minnesota Orchestra. During that same period she won First Place in the Schubert Club Organ Competition.

In addition to her private piano students, Maria was a piano instructor at Macalester College in Saint Paul from 1971–1976. For a brief time she was the pianist for Chanhassen Dinner Theatre for the Fantasticks and I Do, I Do.

Maria Bucka has served two parishes in a church career spanning 61 years. She was hired as the main organist at Hope Presbyterian Church at age 16, a position she held for over 15 years. The remainder of her career has been spent at Bethlehem Lutheran Church Twin Cities where she served as Organist and Organist/Director of Music for 45 years. During that time she supervised the church music staff, created two hymn supplements, oversaw the renovation of the Casavant pipe organ, played for all of the worship





Pipe Organ Encounters' Scholarship Deadline: April 15 The committee on Pipe Organ Encounters is excited about the two programs that will be presented for beginning and intermediate organists this summer. The Fox Valley (Illinois) chapter's POE (June 18-23) at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois, and the Wichita chapter's POE (June 25–30) at Wichita State University, Wichita, Kansas.

Need-based financial aid is available to cover full or partial registration fees for attending a POE. Funds are limited, and scholarships are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. The POE scholarship deadline is **April 15**. The application is an online form and asks questions of both the participant and her/his parent(s); additionally, it requires the submission of a recommendation from the participant's organ or piano teacher, also through an online form. To apply for a scholarship, complete the application submission process to attend a POE event, then contact the director of that POE to request access to the scholarship application.

The scholarship application can only be completed after participants are accepted to attend a local POE. To apply to attend the Fox Valley POE, please email poe@foxvalleyago.org. Please email alindal@gloriadeiwichita.com to apply to attend the Wichita POE.

The traditional Pipe Organ Encounter is a 4-5 day event organized by a local AGO chapter under the sponsorship of the national organization. It introduces participants to the world of the pipe organ. It is a national program sponsored by the American Guild of Organists. Students are admitted to POEs on a first-come, first-served basis, regardless of attendance at prior POEs, and regardless of state or country of residence, as long as they meet the following eligibility guidelines: students should be aged 13-18, be interested in the pipe organ, and have piano or organ proficiency ranging from early intermediate to advanced.

Mini Opus Visits Saint Paul

St. Anthony Park Lutheran is in the process of having a new pipe organ built for their sanctuary. Last fall, Director of Worship and Music, Joshua Lindgren, and member of the Organ Search Committee Mari Espeland visited with Phil Asgian from the TCAGO Education Committee to explore ideas for using mini opus, our Chapter's demonstration instrument, and some teaching materials from PipeWorks Twin Cities to build enthusiasm in the congregation for moving the organ search process forward.

The end result is that mini opus and some teaching materials journeyed over to St. Anthony Park Lutheran in





mid-February to educate congregants young and old about the pipe organ through some hands-on classes. Mini opus was also used in a Sunday worship service to build added enthusiasm, accompanying congregational hymns and performing selections from Ernst Speiss' Six Character Pieces for Children with violin and flute. St. Anthony Park Lutheran Church is now moving toward a congregational vote this May on the proposed new instrument.


