Reflecting on another great TCAGO program year, two thoughts come to mind. First. our exceptional lineup of events and activities continue to serve the diverse needs and range

of interests of all our members. Second, the continued success of our chapter relies on the efforts of many volunteers and on the wholehearted support of all its members.

The year was framed by members recitals, September 25 at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church and May 12 at Normandale Lutheran Church. Among our consistently well-attended and popular events, the recitals provide a performance opportunity for members, bring out a good AGO crowd to hear colleagues and friends play, and they serve as an important outreach to a wider audience. The public outreach of the TCAGO is most clearly exemplified by the annual (Before) Bach's Birthday Bash, held this year at Minneapolis churches. Curated and hosted by Michael Barone, the annual collaboration with MPR and host churches brings out faithful fans of Bach—and of Michael Barone—who brave sometimes snowy, cold conditions to spend a whole day celebrating the music of the great Baroque master. Michael works hard every year to recruit performers and arrange a great series of recitals.

An array of enriching opportunities rounded out the year: a masterclass on hymn playing and service music with Bruce Neswick, a lecture by Jean-Baptiste Robin on French Baroque music and the music of Cèsar Franck, and a lecture-recital by Thomas Fielding on Mulet's Byzantine Sketches. I wish to extend thanks to Kathy Handford and the program committee for planning and coordinating these programs. Thanks also to Randy Egan and John Setterlund who provided hospitality for the masterclass and the spring members recital.

The TCAGO Education committee, under the fine leadership of Phil Asgian, was very active again this year. They collaborated with MPR's YourClassical Class Notes to produce and promote video lessons on the organ and engaged Isabelle Demers as a teacher for the February Pipe Organ Discovery Day, held at Ferguson Hall and Northrop on the U of M campus. They will also be presenting a workshop at the Regional Convention during which they will share the ways they have worked to build greater interest in the pipe organ in schools and in adult education.

The Pipe Organ Heritage Committee hosted two organ crawls. In the fall we visited important Hendrickson organs in the Twin Cities. In the spring we experienced noteworthy organs in Dinkytown and North Minneapolis. A big thank you to Nils Halker and the POHC for their work.

Other important chapter activities that serve the mission of the AGO: The Pipedreams Scholarship committee, under the leadership of Steve Gentile, conducts twiceyearly auditions for scholarship awards to young and adult students. Mary Newton guides the annual chapter level organ playing competition for young organists. This year the chapter level competition was the first step for the AGO/Quimby Regional Competition to be held this summer at the convention. We are proud that our chapter winner, St. Olaf student Aaron Looney, is competing for the opportunity to represent the North Central Region as a Rising Star in the 2024 National Convention in San Francisco.

We cannot take for granted other services our chapter offers to members and the wider public that help promote our profession and the organ. Jeremy Haug is our tireless communications director, who, among his many duties, coordinates the requests for email blasts and Facebook notifications for events promoted by our members. Kirsten Uhlenberg faithfully produces our monthly Pipenotes newsletter, and keeps the chapter website updated. Sarah Garner is the graphic designer behind our attractive chapter print and electronic communications. Jeffrey Patry handles both the duties of registrar and our online placement service for job openings. David Engen manages the TCAGO Organ Database, an essential resource for detailed and



accurate information on organs around the state and the region. The list of volunteers goes on, I'm sorry if I have missed acknowledging more volunteers who are involved in various ways to make our chapter run well!

I would like to acknowledge the Executive Board members who work behind the scenes to steer the chapter. The class of 2023 board members-at-large whose terms expire this June are Lise Schmidt, Nils Halker, and Kristina Rizzotto. On behalf of the chapter, I'd like to thank them for their dedication. Carolyn Diamond has stepped down as Secretary after one year of excellent service. The board has selected Carolyn to remain on the board and fill for one year the empty seat in the class of 2024. And, finally a big thanks to Kathy Handford our Sub-Dean, who has been doing triple duty as sub dean, program chair, and convention co-chair. To everything she undertakes she brings creativity, energy, determination, and whole-hearted dedication to the chapter and the Guild.

Joyce Brown and the Nominations Committee worked hard this year to enlist an excellent slate of candidates for our annual elections. Thanks to her and the committee and to all who were willing to step forward and run for office.

A Word from Our Chaplain

Working Together

In her new book *Declassified*: A Low-Key Guide to the High-Strung World of Classical Music (Putnam, 2022) violinist Arianna Warsaw-Fan Rauch expresses (tongue-in-cheek) some of the frustrations of the music profession: "As long as there have been snobs in the classical music scene, classical musicians have been praying for salvation from

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them" (p. 56). She then mentions Mozart's hatred for the archbishop in Salzburg and Bach's contention with Duke Wilhelm Ernst in Weimar.

"But," she continues,
"musicians often have to
swallow their pride and work
for people they hate...I've
done my fair share of
pride-swallowing..."

Tensions between musicians who serve



churches and various other leaders and administrators of congregations are not new. As a church musician and a pastor, I find myself looking at both sides of the issue. It is clear that many clergy lack knowledge, skill, understanding, or appreciation of music. (What AGO member doesn't know that?!) And there seem to be fewer and fewer opportunities for development in those areas at seminaries and divinity schools.

On the other hand, many church musicians lack knowledge, skill, understanding, or appreciation for theology. And what opportunities are now available for musicians to develop facility with biblical and historical theology? Hopefully, denominational music associations, musicians' guilds, and schools of sacred music can provide needed curricula and other resources. Conductors would do well to explain and interpret the texts that their choirs sing, and congregations (and clergy) can benefit from knowing what the prelude or postlude is about.

Martin Luther famously believed that music is next to theology—a medium through which to communicate the truth of scripture. In the best of situations, these facets of the gospel are discussed and nurtured, along with all the other issues of church work, on a day-to-day or week-byweek basis. I encourage church musicians to read their Bible daily, participate in a lectionary-study group, follow an academic journal, check out a denominational or ecumenical periodical, and take time to pray. As we work together, may the Spirit of God bless our efforts!
