Before Bach's Birthday Bash 2024

Saturday, March 16, 9:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m. Various Saint Paul venues

THE 2024 EDITION IS ABOUT TO BEGIN!!



Our annual Before Bach's Birthday Bash promises a multiplicity of talent and musical experiences. The usual sequence of five hour-long concerts devoted to music by Johann Sebastian Bach this year includes some new performers and new venues. All events are free (donations accepted) and the general public is invited to participate, either for the entire day or at any of the five individual destinations.

At 9:00 a.m. the celebration begins at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church (700 Snelling Avenue South) and features a new 60-rank 1959 Casavant/2022 Létourneau organ. This event will be streamed and broadcast live on all YourClassical Minnesota

Public Radio network stations (KSJN-99.5FM in the Twin Cities) and co-sponsored by American Public Media's *Pipedreams*. Hear organists Nils Halker, Timothy Strand, and Samuel Backman; violinists Brenda and David Mickens; pianists Koki Sato, Osip Nikiforov, and Ines Guanchez; and cellist Charles Asch.

At 10:30 a.m. we travel to nearby Nativity of Our Lord Catholic Church (1938 Stanford Avenue) to hear the 52-rank 2007 Casavant organ played by Catherine Rodland, Stacie Lightner, and Wolfgang Rübsam, with flutist Donna Hryniewicki and violinist Charlotte Yan Ming Lee.

After a 90-minute lunch break, at 1:00 p.m. we visit **St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church** (60 Kent Street North) for performances on the 1921 Skinner/2008 Schantz organ featuring organists Richard Gray, Emily Roth, and Bill Wilson, with pianist Sehee Jeong, soprano Katie Boardman, and trombonist Zachariah Mandell.

At 2:30 p.m. our next stop is Unity Church-Unitarian (733 Portland Avenue) with its 44-rank 1965 Noack organ, one of the earliest large modern mechanical-action instruments to be installed in the Twin Cities. Performers here include organists Mark Overman, David Jenkins, and Thomas Ferry, as well as guitarist Chris Kachian, and pianists Ruochen Xi and Ruizhi Gabrielle Wang.

At 4:00 p.m. we'll wrap up at The House of Hope Presbyterian Church (797 Summit Avenue) to hear Hyein Choi play the Bösendorfer Imperial Grand and the 97-rank 1979 C. B. Fisk put through its paces by Kathrine Handford and Ju Young Lee, concluding BBBB 2024 with Bach's magnificent Passacaglia in c minor.

Dean's Column

The exciting prospect of hearing the King's Singers live in concert prompted me to look through my CD collection for their recordings. I don't know what it is about



the sound of close harmony male singing groups that attracts me, across a whole range of genres from classical to pop to jazz, Motown and classic rock. I found only a couple of King's Singers recordings, but on the a cappella side I also found, of course, Chanticleer and Cantus. I have a CD by The Nylons, and I'll stretch the category to count Manhattan Transfer, but I would also include in the a cappella jazz and pop category the Pentatonix, the Swingle Singers, Take 6, and Straight No Chaser. If we mix in my classic rock and Motown CDs the horizons broaden to include The Beach Boys. The Bee Gees. Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young, The Eagles, and more. (I do not apologize for being a Boomer.) Last fall we had the opportunity to see the Jersey Boys musical performed at the Chanhassen Dinner Theater. So, I would add Frankie Valli and The Four Seasons to the mix. These groups all feature male singers using a wide vocal range from counter tenor or falsetto down to sometimes very low bass.

The King's Singers are certainly the preeminent long-time "classical" a cappella ensemble, owing their characteristic sound to the style of singing instilled in them by Sir David Willcocks, their director of music at King's College. A less well-known influence on the King's Singers was the allmale German ensemble the Comedian Harmonists, a highly successful music group in Europe before World War II. One of my favorite King's Singers CDs is called A *Tribute to the Comedian Harmonists* (1985). The recording includes a wide range of styles characteristic of their German inspiration, from folk to American musicals, to humorous send ups of classical favorites like the *Barber of Seville* overture and *Flight of the Bumblebee*.

In their concert last Sunday, the King's Singers displayed the incredible range for which there is no peer, from Renaissance polyphony, to pop, jazz, and folk, and to new music

They clearly embodied their mission to bring joy and beauty through performing music in all kinds of style and across a wide cultural spectrum, in a way that inspires and unites their audiences in a profound way. At the workshop the following morning we also experienced the sincere joy they bring to coaching other choirs. And to cap it all off in the afternoon we had an inspiring reflection from Don Saliers that tied the experience together in a deeper way. He reminded us of the power of song united with words, from the Hebrew psalms to the present—the power to express holy joy and to transform all suffering.

To brighten your Lent here is a selection of favorite King's Singers recordings from their light side:

Veronika, der Lenz ist da (Veronica, spring is here), a lighthearted spring romp from A Tribute to the Comedian Harmonists. Humpty Dumpty/Old King Cole/The Grand Old Duke of York,

a crazy mash up of children's songs from the recording *Kids' Stuff*, a fun collaboration with Dame Judi Dench from 1986.

You Are the New Day, an anthem of hope from 1980 that got a new video presentation during the pandemic shutdown. Here is that close, precise, clean, perfectly blended sound for which the ensemble is famous. Five of the singers in this video are the artists who performed at the concert at Bethlehem Lutheran Church.

A Word from Our Chaplain Rev. JOHN SETTERLUND



With the fateful words of Lent still echoing—"Dust to dust"—and the Satanic challenging of even God's beloved Son, this season reminds us that we cannot survive business-as-usual. Job's friends promise him forgiveness and happiness, if he will only acknowledge God. But the divine presence

brings little relief. Good people, like all humanity, are not free from trouble.

We see this as the cross of Calvary displays God's intentions for us. What is a cursed instrument of torture stands as a sign of victory over the great powers of death and destruction. Through the whole ministry of Jesus, his crucifixion, and his resurrection, God's ultimate purposes for the world are brought into view. No wonder the fourth gospel speaks so eloquently of the redemptive gifts of the cross: "so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ... I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself."

This outlines God's mission for the Christian, but Isaiah reminds us, "It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob; I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth." May our Lenten prayer continue: O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise.

Andrew Tessman, a past member of St. Helena Parish, began organ lessons with Steve Gentile, who was long-time Director of Music at the church. After graduating in 2006 from the Academy of Holy Angels in Richfield, Tessman worked for

several years as organist and accompanist around the Twin Cities, primarily at Our Lady of Peace Catholic Church in Minneapolis. In 2013 he moved to Bayreuth, Germany, where he obtained his Bachelor of Music in organ performance; further studies followed in Liège, Belgium. Currently he works as an organist in Düsseldorf.

The program includes a trio sonata by J. S. Bach, Michael Burkhardt's Partita on "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," *Messe de Mariage* by Dubois, Scherzo by Kleesattel, and two works by H. H. Parry.

The concert has no admission charge and is open to the public; there will be a freewill offering.

A word of greeting to my colleagues in the TCAGO! Although I retired from my faculty position at the University of Minnesota last spring, I remained on staff at Northrop for this year as the organist/curator of our beloved Aeolian-Skinner, and I am delighted to be taking on the role of AGO Certification Coordinator for the Twin Cities Chapter.

In this role I would like to add a few thoughts about AGO Certification to Dean David Jenkins' excellent column in the February *Pipenotes*. I too thank my friend and colleague Stephen Self, FAGO, for his twelve years of service in this role. And, as David wrote, I recommend to you **President Eileen Hunt's column** in the January issue of *The American Organist*.

As did President Hunt, I took my AGO certification exams when I was a graduate student, and I found the challenges of these tests to be a great complement to my academic studies. to and adjudicate recordings of Service Playing and Colleague tests each year. And in the years since my service on the committee, I have also written numerous tests questions for the Guild exams.

The recent developments and "upgrades" to the certification program that David and Eileen discuss are exciting additions to what was already a very rich set of educational resources that the Guild offers. Especially impressive is the set of webinars on various aspects of different levels of the Guild exams. I encourage you to explore these and other educational resources, regardless of whether you intend to take a Guild exam or not.

I can echo David's and Eileen's observations that the certification program can be an effective enhancement for a church musician's study. In my work as a teacher and examiner I have found it especially gratifying to see how this program can assist organists at all levels of ability and experience and of any age.

So if you are interested in this program and in taking a Guild exam this year or in the future, let me be a resource for you! Keep in mind upcoming deadlines: **March 15** to apply for the May 2024 Colleague Exam, and **April 1** to apply to take the Associate, Fellow, or Choir Master exam in June. 
