Biographies of Performers

Nils C. Halker II has been Parish Organist of Saint Clement's Episcopal Church in Saint Paul since 2006. He is active in the Organ Historical Society, having served on the planning committee for the 2017 national convention held in Minnesota. Additionally, he is an at-large editor of the Society's national journal, *The Tracker*. He serves on the program planning committee for the Æolian-Skinner organ in the University of Minnesota's Northrop Auditorium, on the boards of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and of the Young People's Symphony Concert Association of the Minnesota Orchestra, and is chair of TCAGO's Pipe Organ Heritage Committee. He and his family live in Saint Paul's Como Park neighborhood.

Jean Marie Hellner is an active performer and scholar in the Fargo-Moorhead area. She currently serves as organist at Peace Lutheran Church in Fargo and is the collaborative pianist and organist for the Minnesota State University Moorhead choirs. Jean holds degrees from the University of North Texas, The Florida State University, and Luther College. She studied organ with Peter Nygaard and piano with Rosario Marciano and John Strauss. While at North Texas, Jean played with the new music ensemble (NOVA) and centered much of her research on new music. As a scholar-performer, Jean has given numerous lecture recitals in the United States and Europe. She is also a community activist, being a co-founder of the Community Orchestra Academy and the Edvard Grieg Society of the Dakotas. She serves as treasurer and archivist for the Red River Theatre Organ Society.

David Jenkins retired last June after serving 34 years in music ministry at the Saint Paul Seminary, and as an instructor in organ and harpsichord for the University of St. Thomas. He earned a DMA in Organ Performance and the Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music. He also studied at Oberlin Conservatory and the University of Iowa, and was awarded a Marshall

Jenkins is Dean of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, and has previously served in various other roles for the chapter, including Sub-Dean, executive board member-at-large, and on the program and professional concerns committees.

Aaron Looney is currently a junior at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, where he is pursuing a Bachelor of Music in church music with an organ emphasis under Catherine Rodland. A native of Bridgewater, Virginia, Aaron's musical interests began at the age of five on the piano before shifting to a passion for organ and choral singing. Aaron performs regularly at St. Olaf and in the Twin Cities on the organ and has the privilege of singing with and managing the St. Olaf Choir. Aaron currently serves as Student Organist at Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in Excelsior, Minnesota.

Earlier this year, Aaron was the winner of the 2023 TCAGO chapter competition held in conjunction with the AGO/Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists (RCYO). This allows him to compete at the regional level during the North Central Regional Convention held in the Twin Cities. The competition will be held at the Church of Saint Louis, King of France in Saint Paul on July 4th.

Gregory Peterson is Director of Worship and Music at Normandale Lutheran Church and Professor of Music and College Organist Emeritus at Luther College, Decorah, Iowa. Prior to his tenure at Luther, Peterson was Organist and Minister Music at the Old South Church in Boston, a Visiting Assistant Professor of Music and Christ Chapel Organist at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, and a visiting professor at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma. He earned the BA degree in music at Luther College, the MM degree from Yale University and the DMA degree in organ performance and pedagogy from the University of Iowa.

Evelyn Rohrbach, 18, of Hammond, Wisconsin, began studying piano at the age of six, organ at twelve, and has worked as a church organist and pianist since twelve. She currently studies with Stephan Hamilton, and her past teachers include Christa Rakich and Laura Edman. Evelyn is a two-time recipient of the TCAGO Scholarship and performed a solo recital for the TCAGO historic organ tour in 2021. She is the organist at First Congregational UCC in Menomonie, Wisconsin. Evelyn will be in Paris this July enrolled in the French repertoire master classes held at Ste. Clotilde by master teacher Olivier Penin. This fall, Evelyn will be attending the Jacob School of Music at Indiana University in Bloomington, studying organ with Janette Fishell, chair of the organ department, as a fullscholarship student.

Latvian Brazilian Kristina Rizzotto has played concerts in Argentina, Brazil, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, and throughout the United States. She was named a member of The Diapason's 20 Under 30 Class of 2017, which recognizes young leaders in the fields of organ, harpsichord, carillon, and church music. Rizzotto is also a self-published composer for organ, choir, and piano, with emphasis in sacred repertoire for religious services. All her compositions are available at krisrizzotto.com, including original hymn introductions and reharmonizations for free download (PDF). Rizzotto is the Director of Music at Lake of the Isles Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, and she was previously the organist at the Benedictine Abbey of Rio de Janeiro, built in 1590 and home of one of the oldest organs in South America.

Emily R. E. Roth began her organ studies in high school under the tutelage of Lee Afdahl in Rochester, Minnesota. After receiving a scholarship offer from the University of Iowa, she began studying organ full time with Gregory Hand. Furthering her studies with Dean Billmeyer at the University of Minnesota, she is currently working towards her master's degree. Along with her musical studies, her other interests include painting, singing, and performing popular music.



Dean's Column

It would be hard for me to choose which of the musical events at the regional convention I most eagerly anticipate. The rare opportunity to hear the brilliant British organist Wayne Marshall OBE play the mighty Æolian-Skinner organ at Northrop is high on the list. So is the unique chance to hear Stephen Paulus' spiritually moving church opera The Three Hermits performed at The House of Hope Presbyterian Church under the direction of Matthew Culloton. The concert of music for choir and organs in the sonic opulence of the Cathedral of Saint Paul, featuring resident talents Lawrence Lawyer, Chris Ganza, and Sam Backman, will be another experience that is not to be missed. Plus, there will be a wonderful variety of solo organ recitals and worship music presented by Monica Czausz Berney, Julia Brown, Kathrine Handford, Catherine Rodland, and more—all on exciting landmark Twin Cities pipe organs.

However, I am very much looking forward to the opening concert of organ concertos at the Chapel of St. Thomas Aquinas at the University of St. Thomas. I am especially pleased that we can present the Organ Concerto by James Callahan that was premiered April 24, 2022, at a concert celebrating his 80th birthday. Dr. Callahan will return to the podium to conduct his work, scored for organ, strings, percussion, and horn. Jacob Benda, St. Thomas' chapel organist and adjunct music faculty member, will reprise his premiere performance. The concert will also feature an organ concerto by another Minnesota son, Stephen Paulus, with organist Kris Rizzotto and conductor William Eddins. The program is rounded out by a Bach clavier concerto performed by St. Olaf professor James Bobb.

Jim Callahan is among the wonderful colleagues whom I enjoyed working with over my years at St. Thomas. I admire him for his considerable achievements over a long career at St. Thomas, including his impactful teaching and mentoring of many students, his creativity as a composer and brilliance as a performer, his leadership of the St. Thomas organ recital series and the Sacred Arts Festival, and his unheralded, faithful custody of the Kney pipe organ that he helped secure for St. Thomas in 1987. Awarded the rank of

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Professor Emeritus, Jim retired from St. Thomas in 2006 after 38 years of teaching, including a term as chair of the music department. He also has served the TCAGO in many capacities, including Dean from 2010 to 2012.

I have had many memorable collaborations with Jim over the years, too numerous to mention here. In 1996 I played the Kney organ in the orchestra for performances of Jim's church opera Processions. The opera was composed specially for performances in the St. Thomas Chapel and included St. Thomas choral ensembles and faculty soloists and instrumentalists. The stirring opera plumbs the responses of people of faith in the face of terrible human evil. For one scene set in a church under attack by revolutionary terrorists, Jim asked me to play "the organist," providing some background music. During the scene, an officer orders his soldiers to "stop" the organ music. So, in my one and only "operatic debut," I had to suddenly stop playing in the middle of Bach's organ chorale on An Wasserflüssen Babylon, acting as if I had been shot. Moving from the depths of terror to the heights of the transcendent, we once collaborated in a concert of Messiaen's music at the chapel. He and his cousin, pianist Kathy Faricy, offered a totally captivating performance of Messiaen's two-piano work Visions of the Amen.

Jim has a finely tuned ear for musical color, exemplified in performances like the *Visions*. His ear also gives him an insatiable curiosity for exploring music timbre in his compositions. Michael Barone aired the premiere of the organ concerto on the February 17 *Pipedreams* show. In the recorded interview that preceded, Jim explained that his first step in composing is imagining what special sonorities can come from the combination of instruments with which he is working. You will certainly hear many evocative and unique sounds in the concerto, including the fluttering and squeaking of supernatural bats!

If you are still on the fence about whether to come to the convention, hesitate no longer! You will not want to miss the Callahan organ concerto and all the other exciting musical offerings packed into four busy days.
